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



	being a by-law to designate the property known municipally
	as 26 Queen Street
	as being of architectural and historical value or interest
	WHEREAS Section 29 of the Ontario Heritage Act (RSO 1980, ch. 337), as amended, authorizes the council of a municipality to enact by-laws to designate real property, including all buildings and structures thereon, to be of architectural or historical value or interest;
	AND WHEREAS the Council of the Corporation of the Town of Campbellford has caused to be served on the owners of the lands and premises known as 26 Queen Street and upon the Ontario Heritage Foundation, notice of intention to designate the said property and has caused notice of intention to be published in the Campbellford Herald, the first publication being October 10, 1989;
	AND WHEREAS no notice of objection to the proposed designation has been served on the Clerk;
	NOW THEREFORE the Municipal Council of the Corporation of the Town of Campbellford hereby enacts as follows:
	<ol> <li>There is designated as being of architectural and historical value or interest the property known municipally as 26 Queen Street and more particularly described as Lot 4, Block B, Plan 112.</li> </ol>

#### DESIGNATION OF PROPERTY

## TOWN OF CAMPBELLFORD BY-LAW 1989-66

## for that property known municipally as 26 Queen Street and more particularly described as Lot 4, Block B, Plan 112

REASONS FOR DESIGNATION:

This house was built around 1857 by Sir Robert Cockburn who was also responsible with others for the construction of the first dam built in Campbellford.

This 2-storey home is constructed of regular coursed limestone in the front, with a later brick addition to the north.

The porch - with flat roof and stone pillars - appears to have been added at a later date and is built of 5" coursed limestone.

Second-storey windows are 20 panes double hung plain rail sash with a single lower pane at the bottom.

Central doorway has side lights.

It appears that the two original ground floor windows were originally two French doors  $51\frac{1}{2} \times 96$ , later reduce to  $69\frac{1}{2}$ -high.

The later brick addition to the north has two French doors made of two panels having each four lights 10" x 16" each. Brick size is 8 7/8 x  $2\frac{1}{2}$  (H) x 4 1/8 (D), beige.

Roof has three dormers and the central portion of roof which is flat had a cast iron ornament in the centre.

The rear section of the house,  $20' \times 24'$ , appears to have been the first section built as a one-storey of random coursed stones. The windows of the lower floor are two hung sash 8 x 10 with check rail with wooden sill twelve panes upper and eight panes lower.
