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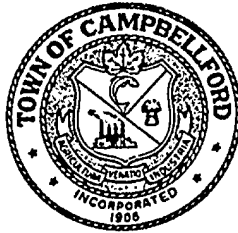



TAKE NOTICE that the Council of the Corporation of the Town of Campbellford has passed By-law 1991-15 to designate the following property as being of architectural and historical value or interest under Part IV of the Ontario Heritage Act (RSO 1980, ch. 337)

126 DOXSEE AVENUE NORTH

REASONS FOR THE DESIGNATION OF 126 DOXSEE AVENUE NORTH

The property was included in the original Crown Grant of 200 acres to David Campbell in 1834, subsequently transferred to Nesbitt Kirkoffer and then to Jane Temple in 1875. Census (assessment) information records a home on the site in 1879. This home is a rare example of a small home of that period which has been virtually unaltered since its construction.

The building is one and a half storeys, 18' x 31', and is constructed of red clay brick with buff coloured brick used for decorative straight lintels over the doors and windows. Projecting brick quoins decorate the corners.

Foundation is of random coursed limestone. The roof is a straight gable type with a gable dormer centred over the front door and upper window. Roof overhang is narrow, about 10" on all sides. The front facade consists of the wide centre door and two windows. Each end has main floor windows and 2 windows on the second floor. Windows are double hung sash with 2 over 2 design. Central gable window is lancet shaped. Window sills are wood.

BY-LAW 1991-34

being a by-law to designate the property known municipally
as 126 Doxsee Avenue North
as being of architectural and historical value or interest

WHEREAS Section 29 of the Ontario Heritage Act (R.S.O. 1980, ch. 337), as amended, authorizes the council of a municipality to enact by-laws to designate a real property, including all buildings and structures thereon, to be of architectural or historical value or interest;

AND WHEREAS the Council of the Corporation of the Town of Campbellford has caused to be served on the owners of the lands and premises known as 126 Doxsee Avenue North and upon the Ontario Heritage Foundation, notice of intention to designate the said property and has caused notice of intention to be published in the Campbellford Herald, the first publication being June 11, 1991;


AND WHEREAS no notice of objection to the proposed designation has been served on the Clerk;

NOW THEREFORE the Municipal Council of the Corporation of the Town of Campbellford hereby enacts as follows:

1. There is designated as being of architectural and historical value or interest the property known municipally as 126 Doxsee Avenue North and more particularly described as Part of Lot 22, Block E, Plan 112, being as Part 1, Plan 38R-3727.
2. The Municipal Clerk is hereby authorized to cause a copy of this by-law together with the reasons for designation attached hereto as Schedule "A" to be registered against the property described above in the proper land registry office.
3. The Clerk is hereby authorized to cause a copy of this by-law to be served on the owner of the aforesaid property and on the Ontario Heritage Foundation and to cause notice of the passing of this by-law to be published in a newspaper having general circulation in the Municipality.
