NOTICE OF INTENTION TO DESIGNATE

TAKE NOTICE that the Council of The Town of Carleton Place Intends to designate the building at the following municipal address as a property of architectural and/or historical value or interest under Part IV of the Ontario Herltage Act, 1980, S.O. Chapter 337(29).

LEGAL DESCRIPTION OF BRAYDON MILL SITE The tract of land and premises being composed of Lot 1, Section M, Plan 474, 150 Rosamond Street in the Town of Carleton Place

REASON FOR DESIGNATION

The building complex is significant as an example of the types of mill structure that were being built in Central Canada in the 1870's. The rubble stonework, quoining and roundel windows are all details commonly used throughout this period.

It is historically significant because it was built by Mr. John Gillies, a major manufacturer in this area during the thirty years around the turn of the century. Throughout his career, he was involved in lumbering, wool milling and machines. Machinery and boats produced in his foundry and machine shops were sold all across Canada. He was one of a group of manufacturers that built Carleton Place into a prominent manufacturing community of the time.

Any person may, within thirty days of the first publication of this notice, send by registered mail or deliver to the Clerk of the Town of Carleton Place, notice of his/her objection to the proposed designation together with a statement of the reasons for the objection and all relevant facts. If such a Notice of Objection is received, the Council of the Corporation of the Town of Carleton Place shall refer the matter to the Conservation Review Board for a hearing.
