IN THE MATTER OF the Ontario Heritage Act, R.S.O. 1980, c. 337; AND IN THE MATTER OF the lands and premises known municipally as 40 Fuller Street in the City of Ottawa, in the Province of Ontario. NOTICE OF DESIGNATING BY-LAW TAKE NOTICE that the Council of the Corporation of the City of Ottawa on the 7th day of March 1984, enacted By-law Number 80-84 designating the lands and buildings known municipally as 40 Fuller Street as a property of historical and architectural value or interest under the Ontario Heritage Act, R.S.O. 1980, c. 337. STATEMENT OF REASONS FOR THE DESIGNATION: The Bayne House is recommended for individual designation as being of architectectural and historical value. The building is one of the oldest structures in the City of Ottawa, having been built about 1828. The house is believed to have been built by Royal Engineers employed on the Rideau Canal, under the direction of Corporal William Ross. Erected by George Bayne as a homestead for his family, it has evolved through many additions to the substantial residence it is today. The building is a two and one half $(2\frac{1}{2})$ storey stone structure with a pitched roof. Although it has been altered (additions, dormers and window changes) the building still retains the character of an early stone residence. The entire exterior appearance of this building and the surrounding grounds (including the stone well) are included in this designation, the interior of the building is not to be regulated. BY-LAW NUMBER . 80-84.

A by-law of The Corporation of the City of Ottawa to designate 40 Fuller Street to be of historic and architectural value or interest;

WHEREAS the Ontario Heritage Act, R.S.O. 1980, c. 337, authorizes the Council of a municipality to enact by-laws to designate real property, including all the buildings and structures thereon, to be of historic and architectural value or interest;

AND WHEREAS the Council of The Corporation of the City of Ottawa has caused to be served upon the owners of the lands and premises known as

40 Fuller Street more particularly described in Schedule "A" hereto, and upon the Ontario Heritage Foundation, notice of intention to so designate the aforesaid real property and has caused such notice of intention to be published in the Ottawa Citizen newspaper having a general circulation in the City of Ottawa, once a week for three consecutive weeks, namely on January 21 and 28, and February 4, 1984.

AND WHEREAS the reasons for the designation are set out as Schedule "B" hereto;

AND WHEREAS no notice of objection to the said proposed designation has been served upon the Clerk of the City of Ottawa;

THEREFORE the Council of The Corporation of the City of Ottawa enacts as follows:

- 1. There is designated as being of historic and architectural value or interest the real property, more particularly described in Schedule "A" hereto, known as 40 Fuller Street.
- 2. The City Solicitor is hereby authorized to cause a copy of this by-law to be registered against the property described in Schedule "A" hereto in the proper Land Registry Office.

- 3. The City Clerk is hereby authorized to cause a copy of this by-law to be served upon the owners of the property described in Schedule "A", and upon the Ontario Heritage Foundation, and to cause notice of this by-law to be published in a newspaper having a general circulation in the City of Ottawa.
- 4. The schedules attached hereto and marked Schedule "A" and Schedule "B" form part of this by-law and all notations, references and other information contained therein shall be as much a part of this by-law as if all the matters and information set forth by the said schedules were all fully described herein.
