NOTICE OF INTENTION TO DESIGNATE

TAKE NOTICE that the Council of the Corporation of the Town of Cobalt intends to designate the property, including lands and buildings, at the following municipal address as a property of architectural and/or historical value or interest under Part IV of the Ontario Heritage Act, 1974, S.O. Chapter 122.

Municipal Address: 72 Cobalt Street, Cobalt. Ontario.

Reasons for the Proposed Designation:

The Reckin House is recommended for designation for architectural reasons. Erected circa 1908 by Elizabeth and Joseph Hunter of Toronto, the building is a well preserved example of a form of housing pioneered in boom towns such as Cobalt; prefabricated speculative rental housing. Charles Reckin, a prominent local merchant, acquired the building in 1916 and the house remained the Reckin family home until 1961. This charming Greek Revival cottage, with its pediment, dentellae, four Doric columns, open verandah and clapboard sheathing, is thus an integral part of the fabric that remains of early Cobalt.
