The building known as the residence of Dr. and Mrs. McDonald is a fine  
example of a limestone dwelling of Gothic Revival influence with Classical  
Revival details. The house is a storey and a half with a lower storey and  
a half tail extending from the west side. The structure has a three bay  
facade with centre gable which is ornamented with a chamfered finial and  
drop. The gable ends of the house are finished with eaves returns. The  
windows are casement windows with french doors along the front facade.

The house was constructed by Sheldon Hawley in 1863. Hawley is considered  
a founding father of Trenton, having come to the settlement in 1817.  
Hawley was engaged in the lumbering industry and mercantile business. He  
was largely responsible for the construction of the first bridge across  
the Trent River and was instrumental in petitioning the government to  
lay out a town site on the west bank of the river. Hawley also served  
as reeve of Trenton during 1855.

ANY PERSON MAY within thirty days of the first publication of this Notice,  
send by registered mail or deliver to the Clerk Administrator of the City  
of Trenton, notice of his or her objection to the proposed designation  
together with a statement of the reasons for the objection and all relevant  
facts. If such a Notice of Objection is received, the Council of the  
Corporation of the City of Trenton shall refer the matter to the  
Conservation Review Board for a hearing.
