
Take notice that the Council of the Corporation of the City of Toronto, on the 15th day of October, 1975, decided to designate the lands and buildings, known municipally as 303 Bay Street, as a property of historical and architectural value or interest under The Ontario Heritage Act, 1974, S.O. Chapter 122.

Short Statement of the Reasons for the Proposed Designation:

The National Club, 303 Bay Street, c.1905 by S. G. Curry, Sproatt & Rolph Associates. The National Club is recommended for designation for architectural reasons as the work of two architectural firms of importance and as an interesting example of the adaptation of brick Georgian-inspired forms to a crowded urban site. The building is of significance historically as the home of the Canada First Movement and in its context as a smaller building to give understandable and human scale to Bay Street.

Notice of objection to the designation may be served on the Clerk within thirty days of January 16th, 1976. (Reference File 0835).
