NOTICE OF INTENTION TO DESIGNATE

Take notice that the Council of the Corporation of the City of Brantford, on the 25th day of April 2000, decided to designate the lands and/or buildings known as Glenhyrst Art Gallery of Brant, 20 Ava Road as property of historical value or interest under the Ontario Heritage Act, 1990, R.S.O., Chapter 0.18.

SHORT STATEMENTS OF THE REASON FOR THE PROPOSED DESIGNATIONS

GLENHYRST ART GALLERY OF BRANT, located at 20 Ava Road, is the former estate of Edmund L. Cockshutt. Built in 1922, it was designed by Brantford architect F.C. Bodley. Edmund L. Cockshutt created his beautiful gardens and welcomed everyone to enjoy them, along with his art collection. He donated to many charities and after his death, bequeathed the estate to the city. Best known for the manufacturing of farm equipment, the Cockshutt family helped to establish such institutions as the Brant Sanitarium, Farringdon Church and Jane Laycock Children's Home and also served the community politically.

Note of objection to the designation must be served on the City Clerk within thirty days of the 28th day of April, 2000.
