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

NOTICE OF INTENTION TO DESIGNATE

2. 180 Moffatt Street, Carleton Place

Construction:

Brick, built in 1883 by William Pattie for Peter C. McGregor

Significance:

By-law 5-79
✓
The house is significant historically since it was occupied for forty-seven years by Roy W. Bates, Mayor of Carleton Place from 1918-1920 and a partner of the Bates and Innes Company, textile manufacturers. It was occupied earlier for thirteen years by David Findlay, co-owner of Findlays Limited Foundry, the town's longest-lived and largest industry. The house is significant architecturally since it is the only one in Carleton Place which has characteristic features of the Mansard style of architecture, popular in Ontario in the latter half of the nineteenth century.

Any person may, within thirty days of the first publication of this notice, send by registered mail or deliver to the Clerk of the Town of Carleton Place notice of his or her objection to the proposed designation together with a statement of the reasons for the objection and all relevant facts. If such a Notice of Objection is received, the Council of the Corporation of the Town of Carleton Place shall refer the matter to the Conservation Review Board for a hearing.
