
Take notice that the Council of the Corporation of  
the City of Toronto, on the 27th and 28th day of October, 1976,  
decided to designate the lands and buildings, known municipally  
as No.19 Trinity Square, as a property of architectural and  
historic value or interest under The Ontario Heritage Act, 1974,  
1974 S.O. Chapter 122.

Short Statement of the Reasons for the Proposed Designation:

The Church of the Holy Trinity, Trinity Square, designed  
in 1846 by Henry Bower Lane with additions in 1857 by William Hay,  
and later interior alterations by Frank Darling, is recommended  
for designation on architectural grounds as a fine example of the  
gothic revival that includes work by three of Toronto's most impor-  
tant architects. The Church is also important in terms of street-  
scape by reason of its central position in Trinity Square. Founded  
from an endowment of a wealthy Englishwoman, Mary Lambert Swale,  
the Church of the Holy Trinity is one of the oldest Anglican  
Churches in Toronto and was the first whose pews were rent-free.

Notice of objection to the designation may be served on  
the Clerk within thirty days of the 5th day of November, 1976.
