No. 38-83. A BY-LAW

To designate the Property at No. 178 St. George Street of architectural value.

(Passed January 10, 1983.)

WHEREAS the Ontario Heritage Act authorizes the Council of a municipality to enact by-laws to designate real property, including all the buildings and structures thereon, to be of historic or architectural value or interest; and

WHEREAS the Council of The Corporation of the City of Toronto has caused to be served upon the owners of the lands and premises known as No. 178 St. George Street and upon the Ontario Heritage Foundation notice of intention to so designate the aforesaid real property and has caused such notice of intention to be published in a newspaper having a general circulation in the municipality once for each of three consecutive weeks; and

WHEREAS the reasons for designation are set out in Schedule 'B' hereto; and

WHEREAS no notice of objection to the said proposed designation has been served upon the clerk of the municipality;

THEREFORE, the Council of the Corporation of the City of Toronto enacts as follows:

1. There is designated as being of architectural value or interest the real property more particularly described in Schedule 'A' hereto, known as No. 178 St. George Street.
2. The City Solicitor is hereby authorized to cause a copy of this by-law to be registered against the property described in Schedule 'A' hereto in the proper land registry office.
3. The City Clerk is hereby authorized to cause a copy of this by-law to be served upon the owner of the aforesaid property and upon the Ontario Heritage Foundation and to cause notice of this by-law to be published in a newspaper having general circulation in the City of Toronto.

SCHEDULE 'A'

ALL AND SINGULAR that certain parcel or tract of land and premises, situate, lying and being in the City of Toronto in the Municipality of Metropolitan Toronto (formerly in the County of York) and Province of Ontario and being composed of part of Lot 36 on the west side of St. George Street, according to Plan 578 registered in the Land Registry Office for the Registry Division of Toronto (No. 63), the said parcel of land being designated as PART 4 on a plan of survey deposited in the said Land Registry Office as 63R-2723.

SCHEDULE 'B'

Reasons for the designation of the Property at No. 178 St. George Street.

The property at No. 178 St. George Street is designated on architectural grounds. In 1891, James McCabe, builder, built this house for Joseph Henry Widdifield, one-time sheriff of the County of York. The prominent corner tower extends as a circle oriel window to a conical tile roof with decorative metal finial. Coursed ashlar stone masonry is the prime material with red brick areas. The fenestration, porch and eave line are highlighted by finely crafted granite stone columns, as well as carved stone mullions and brackets. Coloured glass, turned wood mullions, decorative brick drip moulds, terracotta tile gables and wood trim distinguish this house in its corner space and in context with other important examples of Annex area architecture on this part of St. George Street.
