NOTICE OF INTENTION TO DESIGNATE

Take notice that the Council of the Corporation of the City of Toronto, on the 17th and 19th days of September, 1975, decided to designate the lands and buildings, known municipally as the Sunnyside Bathing Pavilion, as a property of architectural value or interest under The Ontario Heritage Act, 1974, S.O. Chapter 122. The reason for the proposed designation is that the property is a fine example of Beaux Arts classical design adapted for use as an open pavilion by an influential Toronto architect. By its setting on the beach facing out across the Lake, the building forms a scenic backdrop, grand but not without festive character, that is of great importance in the context of the area. As one of the two last remaining buildings of the Sunnyside Amusement Park complex, the pavilion is significant in the historical development of the Toronto Park system and the general life of the City.

Notice of objection to the designation may be served on the Clerk within thirty days of September 26th 1975.
