

CARTWRIGHT HIGH SCHOOL

Description of Property – Cartwright High School: 14220 Old Scugog Rd. Blackstock, Ont.

Cartwright High School was built in 1925. Prior to 1922, students from Cartwright Township, who had finished elementary school and wanted to attend high school either had to go to Port Perry or Bowmanville at their own expense. In September of that year two classes were set up in the Blackstock Town Hall to satisfy some. Two years later in July 1924, a vote was held and by a slim margin of 45 "for" and 42 "against" a decision was made to construct a school.

George McLaughlin was awarded the contract in 1925 to construct a school with two classrooms, a teacher's room and basement.

In 1938, local builder George Crawford added two classrooms, a shop, home economics room, office and library. The basement was also remodelled for washrooms. At that time it became a "Grade A" Continuation School.

In 1950, it became a high school with four regular teachers. In 1974, Cartwright High School came under the umbrella of the Durham Board of Education and housed 120 students.

Statement of Cultural Heritage Value or Interest

The Cartwright High School is of heritage value as an example of early 20th century architecture. It was a historically significant institution to the cultural framework of the village of Blackstock, Cartwright Township, and the Township of Scugog, as it served that community for 88 years.

Description of Heritage Attributes

Key attributes that express the value of the school as a landmark that continues to define the heritage of the village:

- Its location in the core of the village forming a significant vista on Old Scugog Road;
- Was the smallest high school in Ontario until its closure;
- Significant graduate Justice Mabel Van Camp, first woman appointed to the Ontario Supreme Court.

Key attributes that express the value of the school building that reflect an early 20th century architectural style:

- Symmetrical arrangement of street facing façade;

- Medium pitched hipped roof;
- Central shed dormer with paired windows;
- Decorative wooden frieze and soffits;
- Brick vestibule with roof integrated into the slope of the main roof;
- Original window openings with segmental brick arches and lug sills;
- Early 20th century machine made poly-chromatic brick walls;
- Two over two window pane divisions;
- Rusticated concrete block foundation;
- Original front entrance opening with segmental brick arch.
