
Take notice that the Council of the Corporation of the Village of Paisley, on the 5<sup>th</sup> day of December 1977 decided to designate the land and building municipally known as the Five-To-A-Dollar Store ; as a property of historical and architectural value or interest under the Ontario Heritage Act. 1974 S.O. Chapter 122.

SHORT STATEMENT OF THE REASON FOR THE PROPOSED DESIGNATION

The Vanderplas' Store was built late in 1893, the last of the brick stores to fill the area burned out in October of 1889. William Flood, who had been owner of the Central Hotel (Paisley Inn) for ten years, had added a storey to the hotel in 1890, had completed the larger block to the north of this store in 1893, and finally filled the gap between his new building and the Steele Block. His three buildings have the same cast iron mouldings over the windows. The whole facade is of buff-coloured brick stained red. Leaded, stained lights crown the plate glass on the lower storey, maintaining the most original lower storey in the row of brick buildings and enhancing the streetscape considerably.

Notice of objection to the designation may be served in writing on the Clerk within 30 days of the 18<sup>th</sup> day of January 1978.
