A by-law to designate 22 Peter Street of architectural value.

WHEREAS pursuant to The Ontario Heritage Act, R.S.O. 1980, c. 337 the Council of a municipality may by by-law designate a property including buildings and structures thereon to be of historic or architectural value or interest;

## Architectural Reasons

The clapboarded house at 22 Peter Street is an excellent example of the storey-and-a-half Ontario farmhouse placed in an urban setting. Built about 1870, the house displays a symmetrical facade to the street. On either side of the centrally placed front doorway - complete with transom and side lights - are ample sash windows. Above the main door is a small gable which contains a semi-circular headed window. The present well-proportioned entrance porch is said to use parts of the original front porch that ran across the entire front of the house. A side porch (on the north) is typical of farmhouse side porches and is probably original to the house. On the south side of the house is a bay window with distinctive detail in the woodwork.

Inside, a staircase dominates the main hallway, and handsome inlaid wooden floors are found in the parlour, dining room and main hallway. The floors were installed by Robert W. Bennet, one of London's foremost nineteenth-century furniture makers and an early occupant of the house.

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
