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Reasons for Designation

McLaren/Weir Farm (Finnart Farm) Lot 3, Con 1 (R.R. #8 London, Ontario)

Architectural Reasons

This two storey house was built c.1873 for Nathan John Weir. It is a white brick gothic revival farmhouse with a fieldstone foundation. The centre peaked gable features a detailed bargeboard and a gothic window with shutters. All the windows are original and most retain their period glass and operable shutters. The original shed verandah which ran across the full length of the front facade has been replaced by a smaller brick porch built in the 1920's. The front door frame includes a transom and sidelights. The house retains its original slate roof.

The property was recognized by the Middlesex County Historical Heritage Committee in 1984 as an early dwelling of Middlesex.

Behind the farmhouse is a present day car garage. It was originally John Weir's workshop. It was here that he fashioned the woodwork found in the house - including wide baseboards and window frames and even a wooden ceiling. Mr. Weir also built coffins in his woodworking shop.
