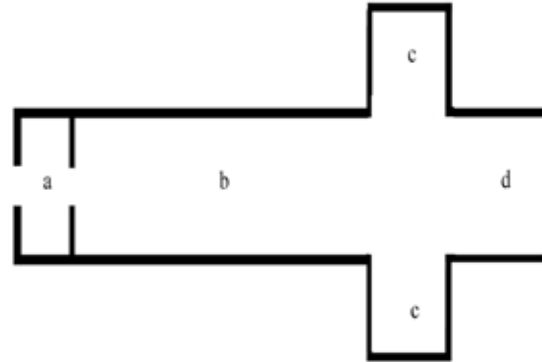

Generally forming the shape of a latin cross, this plan was common in large Christian churches built in the Middle Ages. As a historical revival, it is often combined with a crossing tower massing. Architecturally, it is formed through the intersection of two halls of similar heights that meet at right angles. The entrance hall is called the (a) narthex, (b) the long hall the nave, (c) the shorter side halls are called transepts, and (d) the shorter continuation of that hall is the chancel. Examples: 1. St. Anne's Roman Catholic Church (Penetanguishene), 2. Trinity United Church (Cobourg), 3. Christian Baptist Church (Newmarket), 4. St. Nicholas Serbian Orthodox Church (Hamilton)
