
Take notice that the Council of the Corporation of the City of Toronto, on the 1st day of October, 1975, decided to designate the lands and buildings, known municipally as 260 King Street West, as a property of historical and architectural value or interest under The Ontario Heritage Act, 1974, S.O. Chapter 122.

Short Statement of the Reasons for the Proposed Designation:

The Royal Alexandra Theatre, 260 King Street West; 1907 by John M. Lyle. The Royal Alexandra Theatre is listed for architectural reasons as one of the oldest theatres in the country, and, in this case, a first-class example of twentieth century French-inspired Beaux Arts design. The building is also important in terms of context for the dignity and grandeur that it gives to the westward extension of King Street beyond the downtown core. It is also important for its historical and continuing associations with drama in Toronto and Canada.

Notice of objection to the designation may be served on the Clerk within thirty days of October 10th, 1975.
