BY-LAW NUMBER 38-83

A By-law to amend By-law Number 117-82 (Heritage Designation - 23 Elizabeth Street).

WHEREAS By-law Number 117-82 was passed designating the property at 23 Elizabeth Street as being of architectural and historical value or interest;

AND WHEREAS it is deemed expedient to correct the property description thereof;

NOW THEREFORE the Council of the Corporation of the Town of Ajax enacts as follows:

That Schedule "A" to By-law Number 117-82 is hereby amended by replacing said Schedule with that attached hereto and marked as Schedule "A" to this By-law.

READ a first time this Seventh day of March, 1983.

READ a third time and finally passed this Seventh day of March, 1983.

SCHEDULE "A"

ALL AND SINGULAR that certain parcel or tract of land and premises situate lying and being in the Town of Ajax, in the Regional Municipality of Durham (formerly in the Township of Pickering, County of Ontario) and being composed of Part of Lot 11 and Part of Lot 12 on Plan 68 and shown as Part 1 on a Plan deposited in the Registry Division of Durham as No. 40R-1136.

23 Elizabeth Street (Part of Lot 11, & Part Lot 12, Plan 68)
- c. 1875

Reasons for Designation:

This property is an excellent example of a Gothic Ontario Cottage. Its tongue and grove pine exterior (shiplap) is in excellent condition - having been protected by insulbrick veneer until recently.

The decorative fascia board on the front gable and a semicircular window on the rear wall are particularly noteworthy. Restoration work, done in 1980, also included the rebuilding of the verandah, to duplicate the original as closely as possible, and the replacement of a rectangular gable window by a "suicide" door. This home was the first in the village to be equipped with inside plumbing and central heating (c. 1914).
