
Take notice that the Council of the Corporation of the City of Toronto, on the 18th day of August, 1976, decided to designate the lands and buildings, known municipally as 32-34 Beaconsfield Avenue, as a property of architectural value or interest under The Ontario Heritage Act, 1974, 1974 S.O. Chapter 122.

Short Statement of the Reasons for the Proposed Designation:

The semi-detached house at 32-34 Beaconsfield Avenue is recommended for designation as a good example of the Second Empire style as practised in Toronto. It is, moreover, part of a fine and well preserved streetscape representative of the character of the city in the late 1870s and 1880s when the houses were built. This streetscape includes several other houses of quality and character that will also be recommended for listing. The destruction of one or more of these houses would severely damage the street as a whole.

Notice of objection to the designation may be served on the Clerk within thirty days of the 20th day of August, 1976. (File 1166).
