
Take notice that the Council of the Corporation of

value or interest under The Ontario Heritage Act, 1974, 1974 S.O.  
Chapter 122.

Short Statement of the Reasons for the Proposed Designation:

The Wycliffe College Buildings at No.13 Hoskin Avenue  
are recommended for designation for architectural and historical  
reasons. The original building of 1891, with additions of 1902  
and 1911, are the work of a notable architect, David B. Dick, in  
a simple and appropriate adaption of the Romanesque Revival style  
of the period. Historically the College has been a significant  
training centre in divinity for the Anglican Church since 1877.
