NOTICE OF INTENTION

TO DESIGNATE

Take notice that the Council of the Corporation of the Borough of North York on the 29th day of August, 1977 decided to designate the lands and buildings, known municipally as 19 Don Ridge Drive as a property of historic and architectural value or interest under The Ontario Heritage Act, 1974, S.O. Chapter 122.

Short Statement of the Reasons for the Proposed Designation:

St. John's Anglican Church, York Mills, 1843, designed by John G. Howard. St. John's Church is recommended for designation on architectural grounds as the work of an important Toronto architect, John G. Howard. The building is a fine example of a Pointed Gothic Church with its lancet-form windows and crenellated bell tower offering a contrasting vertical rhythm to its low, horizontal massing. The church was established as the first mission outpost of St. James Cathedral in Toronto. The building also offers an important skyline silhouette as it occupies one of the most commanding sites in Toronto.

Notice of objection to the designation may be served on the Clerk within thirty days of November 30th, 1977.
