
Short Statement of the Reasons for the Proposed Designation:

The Carnegie Library, 214-220 College Street at St. George Street (SW); 1906-1907 by Wickson & Gregg, and A. H. Chapman; 1926 Addition by Wickson & Gregg, and A. H. Chapman; 1930 Addition by Wickson & Gregg, and Chapman and Oxley.

The Carnegie Library is recommended for designation on architectural grounds as an outstanding example of the Beaux Arts style of classicism, both externally and internally, in the main reading room. The building also has contextual importance as a continuation of the line of University buildings westward along College, as a corner element at St. George Street and College Street, and for its relation to the street with a maximum amount of open green space.

Notice of objection to the designation may be served on the Clerk within thirty days of October 10th, 1975.
