No. 282-81. A BY-LAW

To designate the Property at Nos. 107, 109 and 111 King Street East of architectural value and of historic interest.

(Passed May 7, 1981.)

WHEREAS The Ontario Heritage Act, 1974, authorizes the Council of a municipality to enact by-laws to designate real property including all the buildings and structures thereon, to be of historic or architectural value or interest; and

WHEREAS the Council of The Corporation of the City of Toronto has caused to be served upon the owner of the lands and premises known as Nos. 107, 109 and 111 King Street East and upon the Ontario Heritage Foundation notice of intention to so designate the aforesaid real property and has caused such notice of intention to be published in a newspaper having a general circulation in the municipality once for each of three consecutive weeks; and

WHEREAS the reasons for designation are set out as Schedule 'B' hereto; and

WHEREAS no notice of objection to the said proposed designation has been served upon the clerk of the municipality;

THEREFORE, the Council of The Corporation of the City of Toronto enacts as follows:

1. There is designated as being of architectural and historic value or interest the real property, more particularly described in Schedule 'A' hereto, known as Nos. 107, 109 and 111 King Street East.

2. The City Solicitor is hereby authorized to cause a copy of this by-law to be registered against the property described in Schedule 'A' hereto in the proper land registry office.

3. The City Clerk is hereby authorized to cause a copy of this by-law to be served upon the owner of the aforesaid property and upon the Ontario Heritage Foundation and to cause notice of this by-law to be published in a newspaper having general circulation in the City of Toronto.

SCHEDULE 'A'

ALL AND SINGULAR that certain parcel or tract of land and premises situate, lying and being in the City of Toronto, in the Municipality of Metropolitan Toronto and Province of Ontario, being composed of Lots 10, 11, 12, 13, 14, 15 and 16 on the south side of King Street, now King Street East according to the Plan of the Market Block registered in the Land Registry Office for the Registry Division of Toronto (No. 63).

SCHEDULE 'B'

Reasons for designation of the Property at Nos. 107, 109 and 111 King Street East

The row of shops at 107 to 111 King Street East is designated on architectural and historic grounds. The entire block of three-storey commercialresidential buildings from Church to Market Streets, built about 1842, was originally designed in similar Georgian style and may be attributed to architect William Thomas. Numbers 107 and 111 still have three finely-proportioned original window openings with plain store lintels and sills in each of the upper floors. The fenestration and brickwork of Number 109 were altered at a later date. In early Toronto, this group, together with the original buildings that were located on land now vacant, formed an integral part of the facade of the south side of this important block of King Street.
