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

NOTICE OF INTENTION TO DESIGNATE

TAKE NOTICE that the Council of the Corporation of the City
of Orillia intends to designate the properties, including
lands and buildings, at the following municipal addresses,
as properties of architectural and historical value or interest
under Part IV of The Ontario Heritage Act, 1974, S.O. Chapter
122.

- a) The Wilmot House, 30 Tecumseth Street, Orillia, Ontario

Reasons for the proposed designation:

The building at 30 Tecumseth Street has been recommended for
designation for architectural reasons. This house was built
by Jackson Wilmot, a local craftsman, during the 1880's. It
boasts the best preserved example of a board and batton exterior
to be found in Orillia. Nineteenth Century, Ontario Gothic
features include steep pitched roofs, arched windows, bays, and
bargeboard or gingerbread. This structure has been skillfully
converted to a multiple family dwelling and is located in a
secure residential area comprised of buildings similar in age
and scale. ✓

- b) Central Public School, Coldwater Street East

Reasons for the proposed designation:

Central Public School has been recommended for designation for
architectural and historical reasons. Located in the heart of
the City, it was designed by Kennedy and McVittie and built by
R. L. Macey in 1882. This stately Victorian structure with its
extravagant use of decorative brick has served Orillia in its original
capacity for almost a century, and over that period has undergone
little change to its original appearance. ✓

- c) Couchiching Beach Park Bandstand

Reasons for the proposed designation:

The Couchiching Beach Park Bandstand has been recommended for
designation for architectural and historical reasons. It was
designed by W. H. Croker and built by C. W. Bennet in 1909, and
was the focal point of social and cultural events in Orillia
for many years. This ornate octagonal structure in its park
setting overlooking Lake Couchiching serves to remind Orillia and
its visitors of the City's valuable heritage. ✓

may be served on the Clerk of the City of Orillia before the
2nd day of April, 1979.
