TAKE NOTICE that the Council of the Corporation of the City of Orillia intends to designate the property, at the following municipal address as property of architectural and/or historical value or interest under Part IV of the Ontario Heritage Act, R.S.O. 1990, Chapter O.18.

a) The Barney-Bell House, 57 Jarvis Street, Orillia, Ontario

Reasons for the Proposed Designation

The Barney-Bell house, at 57 Jarvis Street is a simple combination of classical and gothic revival styles of architecture along with a few personal additions. The house is a two storey and a half frame structure with a gable roof and original V-Joint horizontal wood siding.

The building is a simple, elegant example of a tradesman's house in which the original design is still largely intact.

The house was built by James Barney, a carpenter born in Scotland, but of English origin. Mr. Barney immigrated into Canada in 1880 and along with his father, Henry, a painter, began what is to be believed as their first experience in house building.
