

AND WHEREAS the Council of The Corporation of the City of Scarborough has caused to be served upon the owners of the lands and premises known as the Christian Reesor House at property more particularly denoted in Schedule "A" hereto and upon the Ontario Heritage Foundation notice of intention to so designate the aforesaid real property and has caused such notice of intention to be published in a newspaper having a general circulation in the municipality once for each of three consecutive weeks;

AND WHEREAS the reasons for designation are set out in Schedule "B" hereto;

AND WHEREAS no notice of objection to the said proposed designation has been served upon the Clerk of the municipality;

THEREFORE THE COUNCIL OF THE CORPORATION OF THE CITY OF SCARBOROUGH ENACTS AS FOLLOWS:

1. That there is designated as being of historical and architectural value or interest the real property more particularly described in Schedule "A" hereto, known as the Christian Reesor House.
2. That the City Solicitor is hereby authorized to cause a copy of this by-law to be registered against the property described in Schedule "A" hereto in the proper land registry office.

3. That the City Clerk is hereby authorized to cause a copy of this by-law to be served upon the owner of the aforesaid property and upon the Ontario Heritage Foundation and to cause notice of this by-law to be published in a newspaper having general circulation in the City of Scarborough.

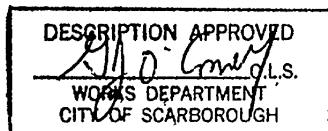

REASONS FOR THE DESIGNATION OF "CHRISTIAN REESOR HOUSE"

The Christian Reesor House is recommended for designation for historical reasons as the farmstead of the Reesor family, a Pennsylvania Mennonite family, who settled in the north-west corner of the City of Scarborough in the early 1800's.

The Christian Reesor House is recommended for designation for architectural reasons as an excellent example of an early Mennonite farm home of the type which were built in the area during the later nineteenth century.
