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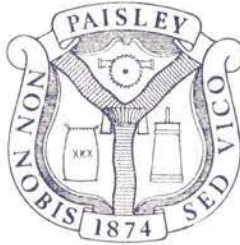

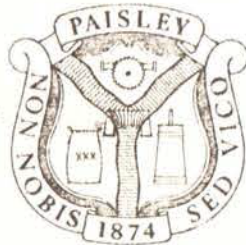

Schedule A

All and singular that certain parcel or tract of land and premises, situate, lying and being in the Village of Paisley in the County of Bruce and being composed of Lot Number Four (4) Subdivision Twenty-Five (25) on the West Side of Queen Street South in Rowe's Second Subdivision according to Plan 39 of the said Village of Paisley.

Schedule B

Anderson's Drug Store is recommended for designation for architectural and historical reasons. The building was built by Frank Carter in 1908 to replace one destroyed by fire. Carter had previously owned a blacksmith shop, a wagon shop, a roller mill and had rented another "general store", prior to building on Anderson's site. He also had two houses built in the Village. The Carter family ran their business (which sold groceries, boots, shoes and crockery) until 1931. During his seventy-one years of residence in Paisley, Frank Carter was very active in village affairs as have been several of the store's more recent owners. He served on Council as well as the School Board. He was a Trustee for the Methodist Church, a member of the town band and secretary-treasurer and Chief of the local fire department. Its present owner has also served on Council and has been a member of the village LACAC.

Architecturally, Anderson's is a two-storey, three bay commercial building situated on Queen Street South. The brickwork is an excellent example of the high standard of patterning

and relief in the twentieth century. A decorative band runs across the top of the building and is composed of six raised, vertical, brick portions with bricked rectangles between them. The bottom course of raised brick flows into the raised quoin design which is used in the piers at the edge of the facade. The three, two-over-two sash windows of the second storey have arched tops and arched radiating voussoirs. There is a projecting wooden course between the storeys with a row of curved Italianate brackets to support it. The double doors on the main floor are recessed with moulded vertical windows in the upper three quarters and a moulded rail and recessed panel below. There is a fine lentil moulding above the door. The interior ceiling is especially noteworthy as an example of patterned tin and moulded edges in excellent condition. The scale and materials of the building are important in maintaining the streetscape of the district.
