By-law No. L.S.P.-3028-249

A by-law to designate 362 Commissioners Road West to be of historical value.

WHEREAS pursuant to The Ontario Heritage Act, R.S.O. 1980, c. 337, the Council of a municipality may by by-law designate a property including buildings and structures thereon to be of historic or architectural value or interest;

AND WHEREAS notice of intention to so designate the property known as 362 Commissioners Road West has been duly published and served and no notice of objection to such designation has been received;

The Municipal Council of The Corporation of the City of London enacts as follows:

1. There is designated as being of historical value or interest, the real property at 362 Commissioners Road West, more particularly described in Schedule "A" hereto, for the reasons set out in Schedule "B" hereto.
2. The lands to be designated pursuant to this by-law are lands within Schedule "A", upon which the building is situated.
3. The City Clerk is authorized to cause a copy of this by-law to be registered upon the title to the property described in Schedule "A" hereto in the proper Land Registry Office.
4. The City Clerk is authorized to cause a copy of this by-law to be served upon the owner of the aforesaid property and upon the Ontario Heritage Foundation and to cause notice of this by-law to be published in the London Free Press, and to enter the description of the aforesaid property, the name and address of its registered owner, and short reasons for its designation in the Register of all properties designated under The Ontario Heritage Act, R.S.O. 1980.
5. This by-law comes into force on the day it is passed.

SCHEDULE "A"

to By-law No. L.S.P.-3028-249

All and singular that certain parcel or tract of land and premises situate, lying and being in the City of London (formerly in the Township of Westminster) in the County of Middlesex, and Province of Ontario, and being composed of part of Lot 34, Concession 1, and being more particularly described as follows:

COMMENCING at a point on the south limit of the Commissioners Road at a distance of Two Hundred and Eleven Feet Easterly from the West limit of said Lot 34;

THENCE Southerly parallel to the West limit of Lot 34, Two Hundred and Thirty-one Feet more or less to a point;

THENCE Easterly parallel to Commissioners Road, Sixty-nine Feet;

THENCE Northerly parallel to the West limit of Lot 34, Two Hundred and Thirty-one Feet more or less to the South limit of Commissioners Road;

THENCE Westerly along the South limit of Commissioners Road, Sixty-nine Feet more or less to the place of beginning;

BEING the lands in Instrument 184852.

SCHEDULE "B"

to By-law No. L.S.P.-3028-249

Historical Reasons:

This building, formerly known as the "Brick Street Church", was built in 1852 with brick supplied by one of the congregation, Nathan Griffith, whose brickyard gave the street its popular local name. The "Brick Street Church" replaced an earlier building which was probably constructed on this site shortly after the War of 1812.

Many historical memories and associations converge at the Brick Street Methodist Church; it is one of the most important heritage sites in the London area, and is the second oldest church building in London (only St. Paul's Cathedral precedes it). It is a physical memorial to one of the oldest Methodist (United Church) congregations in Middlesex County, established in 1815, and many of the early pioneer families of Westminster Township attended and worshipped at the church.
