## Reasons for Designation - 247 Baseline Road East

(revised 3 May 2002)

## Historical Reasons

This house was built circa 1897 and has a south addition dated about 1908. Dr Collyer was an early, if not the original, owner and the design is attributed to Moore and Henry Architects. It is a two and a half storey residence situated on a large, well landscaped lot at the southeast corner of Baseline Road and Wortley Road.

## Architectural Reasons

The house has a hip-roofed central structure with gables extending to the north and to the west. All of the exterior below the roof eaves is faced in London white brick. The two gable spandrels are faced in stucco with exposed timber framing. The windows are double hung sash and the openings that are within the brick work have low segmented arch lintels. The larger windows are divided by a molded centre mullion. There is a pleasant, modest wood-framed low verandah on two sides of the northwest corner together with another smaller porch on the north side with a superimposed balcony overlooking the rear garden. With its brick corbeled chimneys, steeppitched roof slopes and of a generally convenient and comfortable appearance, the architectural style is known as "Queen Anne". It is very much in the tradition of the Ontario country houses of its era.

## Contextual Reasons

The open countryside in which it once stood is now built up and the house is now surrounded by fairly large houses of a much later date. Number 247 demonstrates that a substantial and graceful residence can be built of simple native materials and largely without ornament.
