SCHEDULE "A"

70 ALLAN STREET

The house at 70 Allan Street was built in the mid-nineteenth Century and was moved to its current location shortly after W.S. Davis purchased the property in 1920. The house bears a strong resemblance to the houses built by Duncan Chisholm in Old Oakville in the 1850's.

Owners of the property over the years included William McCraney, Miss Annie Curran, who later became Mrs. H. O'Connell, and William Sinclair Davis. In July, 1992, the house was used as a location for a scene in a television movie starring Jill Eikenberry and Michael Tucker of the television series L.A. Law.

This one storey frame house displays a number of elements of the classic revival style, including shallow pitched roof with cornice and returns, and a remarkably elaborate entrance. The property is adjacent to the Old Oakville Heritage Conservation District, and the First and Second Street Heritage Conservation District, and its architecture is characteristic of the homes found within both of these districts.
