## NOTICE OF INTENT TO DESIGNATE

Pursuant to Section 29(1) of the Ontario Heritage Act R.S.O. 1980, Chapter 337, as amended, the Council of the Corporation of Goulbourn has received the recommendation of its Local Architecture Conservation Authority Committee to designate the following as a building of historical value and interest:

The Reilly Blacksmith Shop located in the east half of Lot 14, Concession 4 on the north side of Franktown Road, at the Franktown and Green's Road intersection (Stapleton area).

The Reilly blacksmith shop is being designated as a heritage building due to its historical significance as a surviving example of the type of structure which housed a commercial enterprise serving a rural community. The simplicity of its proportions testifies to the functional nature of the building in its role as a blacksmith shop. The building is an outstanding example of the vernacular architecture utilized by the 19th century settlers of Goulbourn Township.

The blacksmith shop was built in 1845 by Thomas Reilly. He operated the shop until 1895 at which time his son, Thomas Edward Reilly, took over and served the community as a blacksmith until 1946.

The building is rectangular in shape with the entrance off-centre on the long side. The main facade consists of two bays with the vertical plank door to the left and a single twelve-pane window on the right. The building is constructed of squared logs with dovetail jointing. The roof is a gable with a slightly lower than medium pitch and is covered by sheet metal.

A notice of objection to the designation may be served on the Clerk of the Township of Goulbourn no later than October 23rd, 1992. The notice of objection shall outline reasons for the objection.
