BY-LAW NO. 82 - 12

CORPORATION OF THE TOWN OF SIMCOE

A BY-LAW TO DESIGNATE THE BANDSTAND IN LYNNWOOD PARK AS
BEING OF ARCHITECTURAL AND HISTORICAL VALUE OR INTEREST.

WHEREAS Section 29 of The Ontario Heritage Act, R.S.O. 1980,
Chapter 337, authorizes the Council of a municipality to enact by-laws to
designate real property, including all buildings and structures thereof, to be of
architectural and historical value or interest;

AND WHEREAS notice of intention to designate The Bandstand in
Lynnwood Park was served on the owner of The Bandstand and The Ontario Heritage
Foundation and such notice of intention was published in the Simcoe Reformer, a
newspaper having general circulation in the municipality once for each of three
consecutive weeks;

AND WHEREAS the reasons for designation are set out in Schedule
"B" hereto;

AND WHEREAS no notice of objection to the proposed designation
has been served on the Clerk of the municipality;

NOW THEREFORE the Council of the Corporation of the Town of
Simcoe enacts as follows:

1. There is designated as being of architectural and historical value or
interest, the real property known as The Bandstand in Lynnwood Park in the
Town of Simcoe, as more particularly described in the Schedule "A" attached
hereto.
2. The Municipal Solicitor is hereby authorized to cause a copy of this by-law
to be registered against the property described in Schedule "A" hereto in
the Land Registry Office at Simcoe, Ontario.
3. The Clerk is hereby authorized to cause a copy of this by-law to be served
on the owner of the property described in Schedule "A" hereto and on the

Ontario Heritage Foundation and to cause notice of the passing of this by-law to be published in the Simcoe Reformer once for each of three consecutive weeks.

4. This by-law shall come into force and take effect on its passing.

BY-LAW NO. 82 - 12

ALL AND SINGULAR that certain parcel or tract of land and premises situate lying and being in the Town of Simcoe, in the Regional Municipality of Haldimand-Norfolk, formerly in the Town of Simcoe in the County of Norfolk, being part of the reclaimed lands of Crystal Lake adjacent to Block 82-B registered Plan 182 for the Town of Simcoe and now designated as Part 1 and Part 2 on Plan deposited in the Registry Office for the Land Registry Division of Norfolk as number 37R-2339.

SCHEDULE "B"

BY-LAW NO. 82 - 12

REASONS FOR DESIGNATION

This Bandstand is typical of the many such structures which were built at the turn of the century. Its architectural design is fanciful and decorative, expressing well the optimism and prosperity associated with the Edwardian period of history.

As time has passed, more and more of these park structures have disappeared. The once popular park concerts have been replaced by different forms of entertainment. In spite of changing times The Bandstand is still regarded by many citizens as a landmark. Architecturally it is a unique and important landmark richly deserving repair, continuing maintenance, and a full program of outdoor community events.

The Bandstand has recently been restored with the assistance of interested citizens and a local Service Club and moved from its original setting to a new location in the park area.

The building is deemed worthy of protection under The Ontario Heritage Act.
