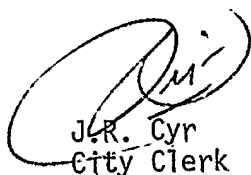

NOTICE OF DESIGNATING BY-LAW

TAKE NOTICE that the Council of the Corporation of the City of
Ottawa on the 7th day of May, 1986 enacted By-Law Number 131-86 designating
the lands and buildings known municipally as 132 Stewart Street as a
property of architectural value or interest under the Ontario Heritage Act,
R.S.O. 1980, C. 337.

STATEMENT OF REASONS FOR THE DESIGNATION :

The building at 132 Stewart is recommended for designation
as being of architectural value. Built in 1874-75 for
Lt. Col. Fredrick White, a prominent Civil Servant, the
building is a unique architectural example of a middle
class dwelling built during the early development of Sandy
Hill.

The building is one and one-half storey brick structure
with a mansard roof. It is further enhanced by its
off-set entrance, a bay window with four pointed arched
openings, a front gable with a cut bargeboard, and a
hipped gable dormer.

BY-LAW NUMBER . 131-86 . . .

A by-law of The Corporation of the City of Ottawa to designate 132 Stewart Street to be of architectural value or interest;

WHEREAS the Ontario Heritage Act, R.S.O. 1980, c. 337, authorizes the Council of a municipality to enact by-laws to designate real property, including all the buildings and structures thereon, to be of architectural value or interest;

AND WHEREAS the Council of The Corporation of the City of Ottawa has caused to be served upon the owner of the lands and premises known as 132 Stewart Street more particularly described in Schedule "A" hereto, and upon the Ontario Heritage Foundation, notice of intention to so designate the afore-said real property and has caused such notice of intention to be published in the Ottawa Citizen newspaper having a general circulation in the City of Ottawa, once a week for three consecutive weeks, namely on the 22nd, 29th of March, and 5th of April, 1986;

AND WHEREAS the reasons for the designation are set out as Schedule "B" hereto;

AND WHEREAS no notice of objection to the said proposed designation has been served upon the Clerk of the City of Ottawa;

THEREFORE the Council of The Corporation of the City of Ottawa enacts as follows:

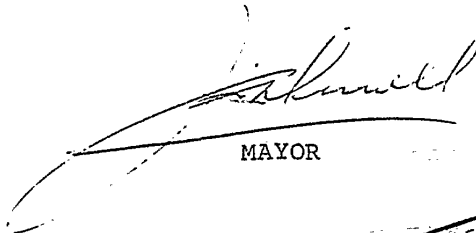
1. There is designated as being of architectural value or interest the real property, more particularly described in Schedule "A" hereto, known as 132 Stewart Street.
2. The City Solicitor is hereby authorized to cause a copy of this by-law to be registered against the property described in Schedule "A" hereto in the proper Land Registry Office.

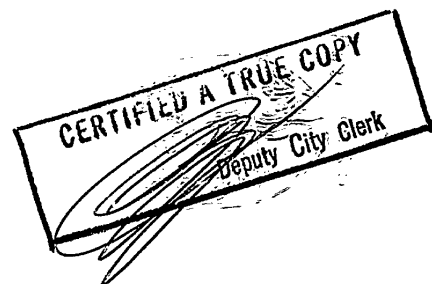

Schedule A

ALL AND SINGULAR that certain parcel or tract of land and premises, situate, lying and being in the City of Ottawa, in the Regional Municipality of Ottawa-Carleton, in the Province of Ontario and BEING COMPOSED OF the easterly part of Lot Number 15 on the south side of Stewart Street, Registered Plan 6, and being more particularly described as follows:

COMMENCING at the north east angle of said Lot Number 15;
