The Archbishop's Palace

BY-LAW NUMBER 353-78.

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> A by-law of The Corporation of the City of Ottawa to designate 145 St. Patrick Street to be of historic or architectural value or interest;

WHEREAS The Ontario Heritage Act, 1974, authorizes the Council of a municipality to enact by-laws to designate real property, including all the buildings and structures thereon, to be of historic or architectural value or interesty

AND WHEREAS the Council of The Corporation of the City of Ottawa has caused to be served upon the owner of the lands and premises known as 145 St. Patrick Street, more particularly described in Schedule "A" hereto, and upon the Ontario Heritage Foundation, notice of intention to so designate the aforesaid real property and has caused such notice of intention to be published in The Ottawa Journal newspaper having a general circulation in the City of Ottawa, once a week for three consecutive weeks, namely on June 20, June 27 and July 4, 1978;

AND WHEREAS the reasons for the designation are set out as Schedule "B" hereto;

AND WHEREAS no notice of objection to the said proposed designation has been served upon the Clerk of the municipality;

THEREFORE the Council of The Corporation of the City of Ottawa enacts as follows:-

1. There is designated as being of historic or architectural value or interest the real property, more particularly described in Schedule "A" hereto, known as 145 St. Patrick Street.

2. The City Solicitor is hereby authorized to cause a copy of this by-law to be registered against the property described in Schedule "A" hereto in the proper Land Registry Office.

3. The City Clerk is hereby authorized to cause a copy of this by-law to be served upon the owner of the property described in Schedule "A", and upon the Ontario Heritage Foundation, and to cause notice of this by-law to be published in a newspaper having a general circulation in the City of Ottawa.

4. The schedules attached hereto and marked Schedule "A" and Schedule "B" form part of this by-law and all notations, references and other information contained therein shall be as much a part of this by-law as if all the matters and information set forth by the said schedules were all fully described herein.

## ARCHBISHOP'S PALACE

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### SCHEDULE A

ALL AND SINGULAR that certain parcel or tract of land and premises, situate, lying and being in the City of Ottawa, Regional Municipality of Ottawa-Carleton and Province of Ontario, and BEING COMPOSED OF the south half of Lot 1, the south half of Lot 2, and the south half of the west half of Lot 3, all on the north side of St. Patrick Street, Registered Plan 42482.

#### SCHEDULE "B"

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"The Archbishop's Palaca, at 145 St. Patrick Street, is recommended for designation as being of historical and architectural significance. Erected in 1849, the Palace has served from its beginning as the Roman Catholic bishop's residence and offices, becoming the Archbishop's residence with the establishment of that position in 1888. The building is sited close by the Choir of Notre Dama Basilica, in the traditional manner. A well proportioned two and onehalf storey stone building with an elaborate entranceway, the Palace is capped with a mansard roof. Several additions were recently removed during the building's restoration. The Palace is one of the oldest surviving buildings in Ottawa and an important element in the heritage character of Lowertown."
