THE CORPORATION OF THE TOWN OF OAKVILLE BY-LAW 1989-223

A by-law to designate a certain property as a property of historical and architectural value and interest (207 Reynolds Street)

WHEREAS the property at 207 Reynolds Street was designated as a property of historical and architectural value on April 21, 1988 by By-law 1988-76;
AND WHEREAS By-law 1988-76 contained an error in the legal description;

AND WHEREAS this By-law corrects the error in the legal description;

NOW THEREFORE THE COUNCIL ENACTS AS FOLLOWS:

- 1. The property municipally known as 207 Reynolds Street, the James Freestone House, is hereby designated as a property of historical and architectural value and interest pursuant to The Ontario Heritage Act for the reasons set out in Schedule "A" to this by-law.
- 2. The property designated by this by-law is the property described in Schedule "B" attached to this by-law. .
- 3. By-law 1988-76 is hereby repealed.

REASONS FOR DESIGNATION

James Freestone, a bricklayer, saved his earnings to purchase in 1877 the property at the corner of Reynolds and Palmer Streets from G.K. Chisholm.

To further his career, Freestone moved to Toronto in 1885. He built many homes in the up-scale Spadina and Queen Street area and also busily began working on many of Toronto's commercial buildings.

In 1887 James Freestone built the house at 207 Reynolds Street. The Collector's Roll of 1888 shows that the house had tenants.

In 1924 the Freestones sold the property to Frederick McCallum, a local banker. The McCallums lived in the house until 1977. It features an L-shaped plan and is contructed of red brick with buff coloured quoins and arches. The typical window shape is segmental and contained within is a round headed window; the main floor exhibits a bracketed bay; the gables are enhanced by decorative bargeboard. Original cedar shares exist underneath the shingles.
