IN THE MATTER OF The Ontario Heritage Act, 1974, Statutes of Ontario, 1974, Chapter 122, and IN THE MATTER OF the lands and premises known as Christ Church Cathedral, Sparks Street and Lauder Memorial Hall, Queen Street, more particularly described as part of Lots 20, 21 and 22, Sparks Street south, and part of Lots 20, 21 and 22, Queen Street north, in the City of Ottawa, in the Province of Ontario.

NOTICE OF INTENTION TO DESIGNATE

TAKE NOTICE that the Council of The Corporation of the City of Ottawa on the 7th day of September, 1977, decided to designate the lands and buildings known as Christ Church Cathedral, Sparks Street and Lauder Memorial Hall, Queen Street, more particularly described as part of Lots 20, 21 and 22, Sparks Street south, and part of Lots 20, 21 and 22, Queen Street north, as a property of architectural and historical value or interest under The Ontario Heritage Act, 1974, Statutes of Ontario, 1974, Chapter 122.

SHORT STATEMENT OF REASON FOR THE PROPOSED DESIGNATION:

"Christ Church Cathedral, Queen Street and Sparks Street, is recommended for designation as being of architectural and historical value. This recommendation includes Lauder Memorial Hall, erected prior to 1902. The site was donated by Nicholas Sparks in 1832. The first church was built during 1832-33. The present building was erected during 1872-73, being designed by King Arnoldi, a prominent Ottawa architect. In 1897 Christ Church was established as the Cathedral of the Anglican Diocese of Ottawa.

The church is of Gothic Revival style, sturdily conceived and comparatively severe. The interior was originally relatively simple, featuring double rows of marble columns. Decorative carving and symbolic figures were added during an interior remodeling completed in 1933. Christ Church's prominent role in the life of the City is matched by its striking location atop the promontory marking the western edge of Ottawa's Central Area."

NOTICE OF OBJECTION to the designation may be served on the Clerk, within thirty (30) days of the 21st day of February, 1978.
