Northwestern Ontario told its employees that the proposed Whitewater Wilderness Park would cause the closure of its mills for several weeks each year. Yet the Ministry shows. in its Nipigon District Land Use Plan that the park would: have no such effect. Even with the largest park option, all forestry targets are met," he said.

... The conservationists stressed that the answer to the forest industry's wood supplyproblems lies not in cutting within parklands, but in following proper forest management techniques.

'The sustained yield harvesting of productive sites, not a constantly expanding land base, will ensure future wood supply," said Nancy Patter-

"Mining and forestry are not secure sources of jobs. Mining fluctuates with the economy and the size and quality of the ore body. The forest industry has mined the forests, and it is now committted to mechanization, which costs hundreds of jobs," said Arlin Hackman.

Mr. Hackman pointed out that many Ontario communities, such as Bancroft, Atikokan and Hearst, suffer because of their dependence on a

single industry.

He said that the common view expressed by a forest industry spokesman, ("if we can't make money, then the forest is not worth anything,' threatens other legitimate values of the resource, and the

"A broken cigarette is a little freedom gained" is the main theme of a new campaign promoting the benefits of life-style free of tobac-

Health and Welfare Minister Monique Begin recently announced that the aim of "Generation" is to encourage young Canadians to become the "breakaway generation" -- free from tobacco. She pointed out that, already twothirds of Canadians do, not smoke.

"The values, attitudes and behaviours related to smoking begin to develop very early in life and continue through childhood and adolescence," the Minister explained. "Once individuals reach the age of 19 or 20 'smoke free', it is unlikely that they will ever start smoking."

The program will continue for several years and is part of Canada's contribution to the World Health Organization's objective "health for all by the year 2000".

Promotional and educational materials will be made available to schools, day care centres and community associations to encourage children to make the decision to join the "breakaway generation".

Since 1965, the proportion of Canadians smoking ha dropped a full 10 per cent from 43 per cent to 33 pe cent. The proportion of wome smoking has remained fairl constant whereas the propoi tion of men smoking ha dropped 15 per cent. Durin the same period, tobacco sale have increased both as a resul of population growth an of increased consumption pe smoker.

-In the 15 to 19 age group smoking among males ha decreased from 35 per cent t 26 per cent, while femal smokers have increased from 20 per cent to 26 per cent.
