

BY-LAW NUMBER 78-90

A by-law to designate a certain property  
as being of Historic and/or Architectural  
value or interest

---

WHEREAS Section 29, Subsection 6 of the Ontario Heritage Act, Chapter 337, R.S.O. 1980, authorizes the Council of a municipality to enact by-laws to designate a real property, including all the buildings and structures thereon, to be of historic and/or architectural value or interest;

AND WHEREAS the Council of the Corporation of the Town of Markham has caused to be served on the owners of the lands and premises at:

and upon the Ontario Heritage Foundation, notice of intention to designate the Markham Train Station located on Part of Lot 13, Concession 7, being 15 Station Street, and has caused such notice of intention to be published in a newspaper having a general circulation in the municipality once for each of three consecutive weeks;

AND WHEREAS the reasons for designation are set out in Schedule 'B', attached hereto and forming part of this by-law;

NOW THEREFORE THE COUNCIL OF THE CORPORATION OF THE TOWN OF MARKHAM HEREBY ENACTS AS FOLLOWS:


1. THAT the following real property, more particularly described in Schedule 'A' attached hereto and forming part of this by-law is hereby designated as being of historic and/or architectural value or interest:


The Markham Train Station located on Part of Lot 13, Concession 7, being 15 Station Street.



SCHEDULE 'A' TO BY-LAW NUMBER 78-90

DESCRIPTION OF LANDS

---

Part of Lot 13, Concession 7 being Part 1 on Registered Plan 65R-9772, in the Town of Markham, in the Regional Municipality of York.

**MARKHAM TRAIN STATION**

The Markham Train Station located at 15 Station Street, being Part of Lot 13, Concession 7, is recommended for designation for its historical and architectural importance as it played a vital role in the development of present day Markham. Its location in 1871, north of the existing village, created a northward growth trend that shaped Main Street Markham. The structure itself is an excellent example of an early rural railway station and has been identified as such by the Ontario Heritage Foundation and Parks Canada.
