caused such notice of intention to be published in a newspaper
having a general circulation in the municipality once for each
of three consecutive weeks;

AND WHEREAS the reasons for designation are set out in Schedule
'A', attached hereto and forming part of this by-law;


NOW THEREFORE THE COUNCIL OF THE CORPORATION OF THE TOWN OF

1. THAT the following real property, being The Robb House, located on the East Side of Highway 48, North of Steeles Avenue, described as Part of Lots 1 & 2, Concession 8, designated as Part 1 on Plan 65R-10506, is hereby designated as being of historic and/or architectural value or interest;

2. THAT the Town Solicitor is hereby authorized to cause a copy of this by-law to be registered against the property described herein in the Land Registry Office.

THE ROBB HOUSE

William Robb came to Markham in 1838 from Lanarkshire, Scotland. He settled on Lot 2, Concession 8, with his first wife, Jane Telfer, in a hamlet to be later known as Armadale. The handsome coursed stone structure known as The Robb House was built in 1853 for William Robb's second wife, Maria Daniels.

The Robb House is an excellent example of the early Georgian Cottage Style, and is constructed of a stone material that is not typical of Markham architecture. The sturdy construction has ensured the retention of its original doors, windows, shutters, storms, chimneys, lintels and quoins.
