

TAKE NOTICE that the Council of The Corporation of  
the City of Ottawa on the 16th day of June, 1982,

STATEMENT OF REASONS FOR THE DESIGNATION:

The building at 62-64 John Street is recommended for designation as being  
of architectural and historical value. Originally built as a semi-detached  
dwelling, one-half of the building was used as a School between 1838 and  
1844. It is one of the oldest surviving buildings in Ottawa.

The building was built in 1837 for millhands of Thomas MacKay. It is a one  
and one-half storey stone structure with symmetrical window and door opening.  
In its overall exterior appearance, it is an excellent example of the  
workman's housing built during the founding of the Village of New Edinburgh.

A by-law of The Corporation of the City of Ottawa to designate 62-64 John Street to be of historic and architectural value or interest;

WHEREAS the Ontario Heritage Act, R.S.O. 1980, c. 337, authorizes the Council of a municipality to enact by-laws to designate real property, including all the buildings and structures thereon, to be of historic and architectural value or interest;

AND WHEREAS the Council of The Corporation of the City of Ottawa has caused to be served upon the owners of the lands and premises known as 62-64 John Street more particularly described in Schedule "A" hereto, and upon the Ontario Heritage Foundation, notice of intention to so designate the afore-said real property and has caused such notice of intention to be published in the Ottawa Citizen newspaper having a general circulation in the City of Ottawa, once a week for three consecutive weeks, namely on the 17th and 24th days of April, 1982 and the 1st day of May, 1982;

AND WHEREAS the reasons for the designation are set out as Schedule "B" hereto;

AND WHEREAS no notice of objection to the said proposed designation has been served upon the Clerk of the City of Ottawa;

THEREFORE the Council of The Corporation of the City of Ottawa enacts as follows:

1. There is designated as being of historic and architectural value or interest the real property, more particularly described in Schedule "A" hereto, known as 62-64 John Street.
2. The City Solicitor is hereby authorized to cause a copy of this by-law to be registered against the property described in Schedule "A" hereto in the proper Land Registry Office.






