



IN THE MATTER OF THE ONTARIO HERITAGE ACT, R.S.O., 1980, CHAPTER 337

AND IN THE MATTER OF THE LANDS AND PREMISES AT THE FOLLOWING MUNICIPAL ADDRESS IN THE PROVINCE OF ONTARIO

NOTICE OF PASSING OF BY-LAW

TAKE NOTICE that the Council of the Corporation of the Township of Ramsay has passed By-law No. 90-32 to designate the following property as being architectural and/or historical value or interest under Part IV of the Ontario Heritage Act, R.S.O., 1980, Chapter 337.

a) Ireland and Smith Residence
 East Helf of Lot 25, Concession 3
 Township of Ramsay

Reasons for Designation

This property, including a log house and several log out-buildings, is typical of early pioneer homesteads of the Township. Historically, it is significant for its early farming establishment surrounding the new community of Clayton, 1823. The owners and their families depended upon the businesses and services of the village for their commerce and well-being. The original deed was granted to Charles Coulter, for the property on Lot 25, on May 13, 1826. The homestead was held by the Coulters until 1903 when it was purchased by the Wm. Bolger family. Coulters are buried on the property. The Bolgers lived in the home until the present decade.

The 1½ storey house, built between 1826, 1830, most probably by Edmund Bellamy, the founder of Clayton (his name was found engraved on the bottom log) is of hand hewn white pine log construction on a rubble stone foundation. The front facade contains a centre gable common to house design of the nineteenth century. The main roof is medium gabled and was originally covered with cedar shakes. Two brick chimneys, one on each end, complete the roof line. The windows were probably of 12/12 design common before the 1850's, but were replaced later by 2/2. The exterior was covered with 4" cove siding around 1900.

THE CORPORATION OF THE TOWNSHIP OF RAMSAY

BY-LAW NO. 90-32

BEING a By-law to designate the premises known municipally as the East Half of Lot 25, Concession 3, Township of Ramsay, as being of architectural and historical value and interest.

WHEREAS The Ontario Heritage Foundation Act, R.S.O. 1980, Chapter 337, authorizes the Council of a Municipality to enact By-laws to designate real property, including all buildings and structures thereon to be of architectural value or interest; and

WHEREAS the Council of the Corporation of the Township of Ramsay has caused to be served on the owners of the dwelling situated on the East Half of Lot 25, Concession 3, Township of Ramsay, and upon The Ontario Heritage Foundation notice of intention to so designate the aforesaid real property and have caused such notice of intention to so designate, to be published in the same newspaper having general circulation in the Municipality, once a week for three consecutive weeks; and

WHEREAS no notice of objection to the proposed designation has been served on the Clerk of the Municipality;

THEREFORE, the Council of the Corporation of the Township of Ramsay enacts as follows:

- There is designated as being of architectural and historical value and interest, the real property known as the East Half of Lot 25, Concession 3, Township of Ramsay.
- The municipal Solicitor is hereby authorized to cause a copy of this By-law to be registered against the property described, in the proper Land Registry Office.
- 3. The Clerk is hereby authorized to cause a copy of this Bylaw to be served on The Ontario Heritage Foundation and to cause notice of the passing of this By-law to be published in the same newspaper having general circulation in the Municipality, once a week for three consecutive weeks.
- That Schedule "A" hereto attached shall form part of this By-law.
