BY-LAW NUMBER 18102

to designate Annis House at 3750 Kingston Road as being of historical and architectural value.

WHEREAS The Ontario Heritage Act, 1974, S.O. Chapter 122, authorizes The Council of a municipality to enact by-laws to designate a real property, including all the buildings and structures thereon, to be of historic or architectural value or interest; and

WHEREAS the Council of The Corporation of the Borough of Scarborough has caused to be served upon the owners of the lands and premises known as the "Annis House" at 3750 Kingston Road and upon the Ontario Heritage Foundation notice of intention to so designate the aforesaid real property and has caused such notice of intention to be published in a newspaper having a general circulation in the municipality once for each of three consecutive weeks; and

WHEREAS the reasons for designation are set out in Schedule "B" hereto; and

WHEREAS no notice of objection to the said proposed designation has been served upon the Clerk of the municipality;

THEREFORE, THE COUNCIL OF THE CORPORATION OF THE BOROUGH OF SCARBOROUGH ENACTS AS FOLLOWS:

1. There is designated as being of architectural value or interest the real property more particularly described in Schedule "A" hereto, known as the "Annis House" at 3750 Kingston Road.

2. The Borough Solicitor is hereby authorized to cause a copy of this by-law to be registered against the property described in Schedule "A" hereto in the proper land registry office.

3. The Borough Clerk is hereby authorized to cause a copy of this by-law to be served upon the owner of the aforesaid property and upon the Ontario Heritage Foundation and to cause notice of this by-law to be published in a newspaper having general circulation in the Borough of Scarborough.

<u>ALL AND SINGULAR</u> that certain parcel or tract of land and premises situate, lying and being in the Borough of Scarborough in the Municipality of Metropolitan Toronto and being composed of part of Lot 2 according to Plan 4918 registered in the Registry Office for the Registry Division of Toronto Boroughs and York South, being the whole part of Lot 2 lying to the southwest and west of a line described as follows;

<u>COMMENCING</u> at a point in the north limit of Kingston Road distant 101 feet 4½ inches measured northeasterly thereon from the most southerly angle of said lot;

<u>THENCE</u> Northwesterly a distance of 114 feet 5-3/4 inches more or less to a point in the southerly limit of Lot 3, Plan 4918 and distant 51 feet 4-3/4 inches measured easterly from a point in the beginning of a curve which last mentioned point is 96 feet chord measurement easterly from the most northerly angle of said Lot 2; <u>TOGETHER WITH</u> a right of way at all times for all purposes for all persons and vehicles now and hereafter entitled thereto, with others entitled thereto, subject to any existing encroachments, in, over, along and upon the southerly 25 feet in perpendicular width of Lot 3 according to the said Plan 4918.

Reasons for the designation of the "Annis House" at 3750 Kingston Road.

"Annis House": The Annis House is one of the last fieldstone houses built in Scarborough. Great pains were taken to cut the fieldstone into perfectly rectangular blocks. The selection of stones for the keystone arches is unique and most beautiful. It is an example of the picturesque style in Upper Canadian Vernacular architecture. It was the residence of Jeremiah Annis who together with two of his sons were members of Scarborough Council in the late 1800's with William Annis being Reeve from 1908 to 1912.
