BY-LAW NUMBER 2024-029

OF THE

CORPORATION OF THE CITY OF KITCHENER

Being a by-law to designate the property municipally addressed as 4 King Street East/1 Queen Street North, in the City of Kitchener as being of historic and cultural heritage value or interest.

WHEREAS section 29 of the *Ontario Heritage Act*, R.S.O. 1990, C. 0.18, authorizes the Council of a Municipality to enact by-laws to designate real property, including all of the buildings and structures thereon, or portions thereof, to be of cultural heritage value or interest;

AND WHEREAS the Council of The Corporation of the City of Kitchener has received and considered the recommendations of its municipal heritage committee (Heritage Kitchener) regarding the designation of a property located at 4 King Street East/1 Queen Street North, Kitchener (the "Property");

AND WHEREAS the Council of The Corporation of the City of Kitchener resolved at its Council Meeting held on December 11, 2023, to publish a Notice of Intention to designate the Property as being of cultural heritage value or interest pursuant to section 29 of the Ontario Heritage Act, R.S.O. 1990, C. O.18, and which resolution was confirmed by By-law No. 2023-183;

AND WHEREAS a copy of the Notice of Intent to Designate was served upon the registered owners of the Property and upon the Ontario Heritage Trust;

AND WHEREAS a copy of the Notice of Intent to Designate was published in the Waterloo Region Record, which is a newspaper having general circulation in the City of Kitchener on December 15, 2023, a copy of which is attached to this by-law as "Schedule A";

AND WHEREAS no Notice of Objection to the proposed designation has been served upon the Clerk of the City of Kitchener;

NOW THEREFORE the Council of The Corporation of the City of Kitchener enacts as follows:

- 1. The building and property known as 4 King Street East/1 Queen Street North, Kitchener, as more particularly described in Schedules "B" and "C" to this by-law are hereby designated as being of cultural value or interest under Part IV, section 29 of the *Ontario Heritage Act*, R.S.O. 1990, C. 0.18;
- 2. The City Solicitor is hereby authorized to cause a copy of this by-law to be registered against the whole of the property described in Schedule "D" to this by-law with the Land Registry Office;
- 3. The City Clerk is hereby authorized to cause a copy of this by-law to be served upon the registered owners of the property described in Schedule "D" to this by-law and on the Ontario Heritage Trust; and,
- 4. The City Clerk is hereby authorized to publish a notice of this by-law in a newspaper having general circulation in the City of Kitchener.

TAKE NOTICE that the Council of the Corporation of the City of Kritchener Intends to designate the following municipal addresses as being of cultural heritage value or interest under Part IV of the Ontario Heritage Act. R.S.O. 1990, Chapter O.58, as amended.

2# Countand Avenue East

The property municipally addressed as 24 Countend Avenue East demonstrates design/physical, historical/associative and contentral value. The design and physical value of the property relates to the unique Vernacular Victorian Gothic architectural style. Walk-up now housing is rare in the curricul of Kitchener, as there are not many examples of this housing typology within the City.

The historical and associative value of the property relates to the engine lowner, purpose, and relationship to adjacent industrial buildings. The wak-up row housing is representative of the industrial development that was taking place in Mitchener in the late 19° and early 20° century. The building was constructed by Martin Nelson to accommodate the female workers from the adjacent Williams. Greene and Rome Shirt and Dofan Facciny on Queen Street South (how known as the Bread and Roses Cooperative).

The contextual value of the property relates to the building's historic and visual link to the adjacent industrial buildings, including the former Williams, Greene and Rome Shirt and Octor Factory and the Arrow Shirt Factory.

25 Courtland Avenue East

The property municipally addressed as 26 Courtland Avenue East demonstrates designiphysical, historical/associative and contextual value. The design and physical value of the property relates to the unique Vernacular Victorian Gratic architectural style. Walk-up role housing is rare in the correct of Kitchener, with not many examples of this housing typology within the City.

The historical and associative value of the property relates to the original owner, purpose, and relationship to adjacent industrial buildings. The walk-up now industrial property relates to the original owner, purpose, and relationship to adjacent industrial buildings. The design and physical value of the property relates to the building being a representative example of the Renaissance Renail architectural style that is in good condition with many in-tact original elements.

The historical and associative value of the property relates to the original owner and use of the property, as well as the contribution made to the history of Kilchener's development.

The contextual value of the property relates to its contribution to a collection of buildings constructed during the industrial and commercial development of Kitchener. The building on the subject property is in its original location and maintains historical and visual links to its summertings.

66 Queen Street South

The property manifically activessed as 66 Queen Steel South demonstrates design/physical, and historical/associative, and contextual values. The design and physical value of the property matter to the building being a representative grample of the Retailstance Revival architectural style that is in good condition with many in-cart original elements.

The historical and associative value of the property relates to the original owner and use of the property, as well as the contribution grade to the history of Kitchener's development.

The contextual value of the property relates to its contribution to a collection of halitings constructed during the industrial and commercial development of Kilchener. The building on the subject property is in its original location and maintains historical and visual links to its summercines.

73 Young Street

The property municipally addressed as 73 Young Street demonstrates design/physical, and historica/associative, and contextual values. The design and physical value of the property relates to its Gothic architectural style, laid out in the shape of a Latin Cross with extensive use of decorative brock and stone moulding, butnesses, and circular brick ties, and metall symmetry of the church with similar façade and femestration patterns throughout.

The historical and associative value of the property relates to the original owner and use of the property and building, and the contitutions made to Kitchener's history. The land has always been used as a church and contains one of the otdest churches in fotchener. The subject property has direct associations with Arthur William Holmes, a prominent architect who devoted most of their career to designing buildings for the Roman Catholic Church in Southern Critario.

The contextual value of the property relates in physical, historical, functional, and visual links to the building's surroundings. The church building-has a strong visual presence, including important views, on Duke Street and Young Street as the building occupies a large site slightly stevated on a hill. The church building has also been recognised as a landmark within the City of Kitchener.

4 King Street East/1 Queen Street South

The property manufacility addressed as 4 King Skeet East/1 Queen Street South demonstrates design/bhysical, historical/associative, contentual, and economic values.

The design and physical values relate to the italianate architectural style that is in good candilion with many intact original elements

The historical and associative values made to the original owner and use of the building. The original owner of the building was Louis Breithaupt while the original use of the building was a hotel, tilled the American Hotel. The building is the oldest commercial building is the City. Louis Smithaupt was a prominent business in Berlin as well as a former mayor, and his combutions to the development of Berlin form an integral display in Berlin's commercial and industrial development.

This building has comedual value, being built in the downlown commercial-core of then-Berlin and part of a group of buildings that were built at the cross tof industrial and commercial development in the City. Today, these buildings are in the downlown commercial core of kitchener and greatly contribute to the character of the area. The building is in its original location and graintains historical and visual links to its summercials. Furthermore, the building is located at a producent intersection in the downlown city core.

2-22 Daise Street West

The property municipally addressed as 2-22 Duke Street West demonstrates design/physical, historical/associative, and contential values.

The belighing municipally addressed as 2-22 Duke Street East has design and physical value, being a notable and unique example of the Art Deno architectural style as well as displaying a high degree of traffmanship through the many detailed elements of the structure.

The property has historical and associative values, as it relates directly to the theme of economic growth and development in the downtow area and has direct association with the Breithaupt family through its original ownership.

The contextual value of the property entance to its physical, bistorical, functional, and visual link to its surroundings. The building sits on the intersection of Queen Street North and Dake Street East, in its original location. It retains its original use as the home to multiple local businesses.

40 Chapel Hill Drive

The property municipalty addressed as 40 Chapel 181 Drive demonstrates designiphysical, historical associative, and contexual values. The design and physical value of 40 Chapel HB Onve resides in its Modern architectural style, is identify an imaginar floor plan and utilizing a mix of natural building materials including stone, werical wood sking and wood shingles. The chosen design is symbolic in nature, and relates to the theology of the Carmel Church of New Jerusalem.

to the theorogy of the Carmel Church of New Jensalem.

The historical and associative value of 40 Chapel HII relates to the original owners and use of the property and building. The building was constructed by the Carmel Church of New Jenusalem, who remain the owners to date. The Carmel Church of the New Jenusalem is a society of the New Church, which is a Christian denomination that follows the theoriginal writings and interpretations of famous 10° cantury Seedish scientists, philosophies, and theologian Emanual Swedenburg. Such seets can be referred to as Swedenburgians. The Pennsylvania groups of Swedenburgian were one of the principal sources of immigration to Wateriole County, and Inter-craftled the emigratory of the Berlin Association in the middle of the nincipents commun. The property also provides some insight into patients of greats and development within the area, being formally the control of a midependent and self-sufficient drutch community known as Carryndale. When and a growing population led in the community's eventual annexation into Nichener in the 1970's. The subject properly and the summuniting area have been identified as being a Cultural Heritage Landscape.

54-68 King Street West

The property municipally addressed as 54-58 King Street West demonstrates design/physical, historical/associative, and contextual values. The design and physical value of 64-68 King Street West resides in its architecture and physical construction. The building is a unique expression of Modernial architecture that also utilizes classical and neo-classical motifs, it is this septisticated blending of different styles from varying crass that make the subject property a significant piece of architecture wishs the community. Through its capacial use and other detailing it also displays a high degree of continuouship.

The historical and associative value of the property lay in its significant association with banking institutions. Prior to becoming the Bank of Nova Social in 1925, the property held a building formerly known as the Memor Block, which was occupied by the funion Bank. The Memor Block was demolated in 1952 and replaced with the existing one-storey building. This building also has significance due to its association with programs and imitiatives undertaken by the bank that reflected how such institutions and their processes thanged and developed over time. It reflects the economic climate of both the area and, to some degree, the country at the time of its construction. The building was designed by Carl Albert Rieder, a prominent local and field who made significant contributions to the field during the scan of his career.

The contextual value of S4-68 King Street, West relates to its importance in maintaining the commercial character of the surrounding area, as well as its physical, functional, visual, and historical link to its surroundings. It is within the Downtown Cultural Harlage Landscape, which is within the City Centre District and is an area that has instantially been recognized as the heart of the downtown and a local point of the Region, in addition, the distinct and this content style of S4-65 King Street Westland its facation on a corner to atomic and incoming makes the ding prominently visible and easily recognizable

78 Francis Street North

The procenty muckipally addressed as 70 Francis Street North demonstrates design/physical, historicatiassociative, and contextual values, The building at 70 Francis Street North has design and physical value, being a representative example of a late-19° century residential dwelling constructed in the Queen Anne Revival architectural style.

The property has historical and associative value has to its the original ownership as well as its connection to the trains of economic development which the City. The residential dwalling was built for Albert Ruby, a prominent ditten and tile-long resident of Berlin (now Kitchener) and a major contributor to the familiare industry within the area. H. King Furniture Company was established in the 1890's by Albert Ruby in partnership with Hartman King. Its establishment was instrumental to the growth and development of the City and its economy, being required to be the largest furniture plant in the British Empter in the early 1800's, King Furniture continues to be a laster in the design and manufacturing of furniture solutions, specifically now for offices and healthcare, and it remains one of the offest businesses sail operating in Ritichener. The Butty family still has direct and significant less with the company, with Lon Ruby being its president in 2023.

The contextual value of 70 Francis Street North males to the physical, and visual links to the surrounding area. The briding is in 15 original legistics along Francis Street North and is surrounded by distinct feature buildings. Though the house is now used as an office space, it continues to continue to the confincity and character of the Francis Street North streetscape. Further, it is historically linked to the Knug Sumiture factory incomed in proximity at 111 Abrens Street West*125 Breithaupt Street.

144-159 King Street West

The front façade of the procesty municipally addressed as 144-150 King Street West demonstrates designiphysical, historical associative.

The design and physical value of the building reades in its architecture and physical construction, as the building is a representative example of the Classical Revival architectural style. A high degree of technical and scientific activement is demonstrated, as the front façade is they be the first in the City to the build with precess concrete, in addition, it is believed that this building was the trist within the City to install an elevator. The property has historical and associative value due to its connection to the theme of economic development in the downtown area. The contextual value of the building relates to its importance in mantstoring the commercial character of the surrounding area, as well as its physical, functional, visual, and historical link to its surroundings. The surrounding area is occupied by a mix of uses, with holy's, banks, and other commercial enterprises being the original anchors of the commercial core. Though the upper sorreys are now residential units, the ground floor maintains its original commercial use and continues to support the commercial character of the area.

149-151 Ontario Street North

The property municipally addressed as 149-151 Ontario Street North demonstrates designiphysical, and historical/associative values. The building is an early example of a late 19th century, semi-detached, vernacular book building with both transmite and modest Georgian

The property has historical and associative value because it is the last remaining example of a residential building in this section of Ontario Street North and is an example of a working-class residence.

625 New Dunder Road

The property municipalty authorised as 628 New Dundee Road demonstrates design/physical, historical/associative, and contextual values. The owelling on the lot is a representative and early example of a dwelling constructed in the Gothic Revivel Cottage architectural style. Common features characteristic of this specific style are displayed, and the building was constructed prior to Confederation in 1857.

Historical associative values are displayed as the property was once a working 19° certury egicultural farm complex and is therefore associated with themes of agriculture and int-19° certury agricultural practices. Further, it is associated with the theme of early selftement in the Beastey's Old Survey area of Waterloo Township. The structure also decomposates local materials available to selfer and communications methods utilized during the late nineteenth century and, when compared to similar style buildings within the area, caveals some self-terror through the art. exclaired and bends.

The dwelling on the lot has contential value as the surroundings largely retain that rural character. The farmhouse also meintains a relationship to and remains oriented towards New Dundes Boad, which is the original settlement road that once bisacted the lot, As such, the dwelling has a physical link to its surroundings.

67 King Street East

he property municipally addressed as 67 King Street East demonstrates designiphysical, historical associative, and committee values. The design and physical value of the subject property resides in the architecture and physical construction of the building. It is a unique and representative example of the International architectural style in a commercial building.

The building passesses historical and associative value due to its original use and ownership. The building was originally owned and operated by the Canada Permanant Trust Company, whose origins as a frust company data back to 1885. At the time that 67 king Sheet East was constructed. Canada Permanent was the object trust company in Canada. The architecture firm which dasigned the building also contributes to the historical and associative value of 67 king Sheet East. The building was designed by the firm of prominent local and associative.

The cortestast value of 67 King Street East relates to its importance in maintaining the commercial character of the surrounding area, as well as its physical, functional, visual, and historical link to its surroundings. The subject property is located within the Downtoon Cultural Heritage Landscape, in an area commonly recognized as the heart of the downtown and the historically focal point of early development in what was then Sertin. Further it is located in-situ within a notable setting, as the building provides a frame for the adjacent Speakers Corner Park space.

SCHEDULE B

STATEMENT OF CULTURAL HERITAGE VALUE OR INTEREST

4 KING STREET EAST/1 QUEEN STREET NORTH, KITCHENER

Description of Cultural Heritage Resource

4 King Street East/1 Queen Street North is a 19th century commercial building built in the Italianate architectural style. The building is situated on a 0.46 acre parcel of land located on the north east corner of King Street East and Queen Street North in the City Commercial Core Planning Community of the City of Kitchener within the Region of Waterloo. The principal resource that contributes to the heritage value is the commercial building.

Heritage Value

4 King Street East/1 Queen Street North is recognized for its design/physical, significant historical/associative and contextual values.

Design/Physical Value

The design and physical values relate to the Italianate architectural style that is in good condition with many intact original elements. The building features: yellow brick construction; individual facades, including some original main street storefronts; simple cornice with single wood brackets; and semi-circular window openings with brick voussoirs. The building has been painted white.

South (Front) Façade

The existing building is 3 storeys in height and constructed of brick with a flat roof. The ground floor contains a commercial unit and the upper storeys contain two full 6/6 semi-circular hung windows with brick voussoirs and one partial 6/6 semi-circular window that it shares with 8-10 King Street East on each storey. At the top of this façade, there is a cornice with decorative brackets and decorative brick work that extends throughout the façade. The cornice and the brackets used to be red but have since been painted black.

West (Side) Façade

This façade extends along Queen Street North and has a similar fenestration pattern as the front façade. The façade contains commercial stores at the ground level, with 15 windows on each storey. These windows are 6/6 semi-circular hung windows with brick voussoirs and sills. At the top of this façade is the cornice with decorative brackets and decorative brickwork.

North (Rear) Façade

The façade has been altered. The façade did not have any window openings or door openings and was a blank façade. Since then, the window has been altered with window openings on each storey.

Although there have been several alterations to the building over the years, including the alterations that had to be made because of a fire, the building still maintains some of its original elements and is still representative of its Italianate architectural style and retains its heritage integrity.

Historical/Associative Value

The historical and associative values relate to the original owner and use of the building. The original owner of the building was Louis Breithaupt while the original use of the building was a hotel – the American Hotel. The American Hotel was built by Louis Breithaupt in 1862-1863 for \$9000.00. It is estimated that the building has served as a hotel for approximately 100 years. The building is the oldest commercial building in the City. Louis Breithaupt was a prominent business in Berlin as well as a former mayor, and his contributions to the development of Berlin form an integral chapter in Berlin's commercial and industrial development.

Contextual Value

This building has contextual value as being built in the downtown commercial core of Berlin, before it became Kitchener, and is a part of a group of buildings that were built at a time when industrial and commercial development in Berlin (now Kitchener) was happening. Today, these buildings are located in the downtown commercial core of Kitchener, and greatly contribute to the character of the area. The building is in its original location, and maintains historical and visual links to its surroundings. Furthermore, this building is the oldest commercial building in the City and located a prominent intersection in the downtown city core, contributing to its contextual value.

Other Values

Economic Value

The existing building has economic value as being representative of a building with a history that contributes to the economic development that was taking initially in Berlin, and then in Kitchener in the late 19th and early 20th century.

DESCRIPTION OF HERITAGE ATTRIBUTES

4 KING STREET EAST/1 QUEEN STREET NORTH, KITCHENER

Heritage Attributes

The heritage value of 4 King Street East/1 Queen Street North resides in the following heritage attributes:

- All elements related to the construction and Italianate architectural style of the building, including:
 - o yellow brick construction;
 - individual front, rear, and west facades on the second and third storey, except for the east facade;
 - o roof and roofline;
 - o Decorative brickwork around the single wood brackets;
 - o simple cornice with single wood brackets; and,
 - semi-circular window openings with brick voussoirs and sills on the front and west (Queen Street) facade;
 - All contextual elements related to the building including:
 - Its original location on Queen Street South streetscape and its contribution to the Kitchener downtown commercial area.
