OF THE

CORPORATION OF THE CITY OF KITCHENER

Being a by-law to designate the property municipally addressed as 2-22 Duke Street East, in the City of Kitchener as being of historic and cultural heritage value or interest.

WHEREAS section 29 of the *Ontario Heritage Act*, R.S.O. 1990, C. 0.18, authorizes the Council of a Municipality to enact by-laws to designate real property, including all of the buildings and structures thereon, or portions thereof, to be of cultural heritage value or interest;

AND WHEREAS the Council of The Corporation of the City of Kitchener has received and considered the recommendations of its municipal heritage committee (Heritage Kitchener) regarding the designation of a property located at 2-22 Duke Street East, Kitchener (the "Property");

AND WHEREAS the Council of The Corporation of the City of Kitchener resolved at its Council Meeting held on December 11, 2023, to publish a Notice of Intention to designate the Property as being of cultural heritage value or interest pursuant to section 29 of the *Ontario Heritage Act*, R.S.O. 1990, C. O.18, and which resolution was confirmed by By-law No. 2023-183;

AND WHEREAS a copy of the Notice of Intent to Designate was served upon the registered owners of the Property and upon the Ontario Heritage Trust;

AND WHEREAS a copy of the Notice of Intent to Designate was published in the Waterloo Region Record, which is a newspaper having general circulation in the City of Kitchener on December 15, 2023, a copy of which is attached to this by-law as "Schedule A":

AND WHEREAS no Notice of Objection to the proposed designation has been served upon the Clerk of the City of Kitchener;

NOW THEREFORE the Council of The Corporation of the City of Kitchener enacts as follows:

- 1. The building and property known as 2-22 Duke Street East, Kitchener, as more particularly described in Schedules "B" and "C" to this by-law are hereby designated as being of cultural value or interest under Part IV, section 29 of the Ontario Heritage Act, R.S.O. 1990, C. 0.18;
- 2. The City Solicitor is hereby authorized to cause a copy of this by-law to be registered against the whole of the property described in Schedule "D" to this by-law with the Land Registry Office;
- The City Clerk is hereby authorized to cause a copy of this by-law to be served upon the registered owners of the property described in Schedule "D" to this bylaw and on the Ontario Heritage Trust; and,
- 4. The City Clerk is hereby authorized to publish a notice of this by-law in a newspaper having general circulation in the City of Kitchener.

NOTICE OF INTENTION

TAKE NOTICE that the Council of the Corporation of the City of Kitchener Intends to designate the following municipal addresses as being of cultural bentage value or interest under Part IV of the Onland Hertage Act. R.5.0. 1990, Chapter Q.18, as amended.

24 Courtland Avenue East

The property municipally addressed as 24 Courdand Avenue East demonstrates design/physical, historical/associative and contextual value. The design and physical value of the property relates to the unique Vernacular Victorian Gothic architectural style. Walk-up row housing is rare in the context of Kitchener, as there are not many examples of this housing hypology within the City.

The histonical and associative value of the property relates to the original owner, purpose, and relationship to adjacem industrial buildings. The wark-up now housing is representative of the industrial development that was taking place in Mitchener in the late 19° and early 20° century. The building was constructed by Martin Neison to accommodate the female workers from the adjacent Williams. Greene and Rome Shirt and Collar Factory on Queen Street South (now known as the Bread and Roses Cooperative).

The contextual value of the property relates to the building's historic and visual first to the adjacent industrial buildings, including the former Williams, Greene and Rome Shirt and Collar Featury and the Arrow Shirt Factory.

25 Courtland Awanue East

The property municipally addressed as 26 Courdend Avenue East demonstrates design/physical. Instantativescollable and contextual value. The design and physical value of the property relates to the unique Vernacutar Victorian Gothic architectural style. Walk-up now housing is rare in the context of Kitchener, with not many examples of this housing typology within the City.

The historical and associative value of the property retailes to the original owner, purpose, and relationship to adjacent industrial buildings. The walk-up row housing is representative of the industrial development that was taking place in Krichener in the late 19° and early 20° century. The building was constructed by Martin Neison to accommodate the female workers from the adjacent Williams. Greene and Rome Shirt and Collar Factory on Queen Steet South (now known as the Bread and Roses Cooperative).

The correctual value of the property relates to the building's historic and visual link to the adjacent industrial buildings, including the former Williams, Greene and Rome Shirt and Collar Factory and the Arrow Shirt Factory.

58 Queen Street South

The property manipulary addressed as 58 Queen Street South demonstrates design/physical, and historical/associative, and equipment values. The design and physical value of the property relates to the building being a representative example of the Renaissance Revival architectural style that is in good condition with many in-tact original elements.

The historical and associative value of the property relates to the original owner and use of the property, as well as the contribution made to the history of Kitchener's development.

The contextual value of the property relates to its contribution to a collection of helitings consortated curing the industrial and commercial development of Kilchener. The building on the subject property is in its neighbli location and maintains historical and visual links to its summercines.

65 Queen Street South

The property municipally addressed as 66 Queen Sheet South demonstrates design/physical, and historical/associative, and contextual values. The design and physical value of the property relates to the building being a representative example of the Restrissance Reswal architectural style that is in good condition with many in-sact original elements.

The historical and associative value of the property relates to the original owner and use of the property, as well as the contribution made to the history of Kitchener's development.

The contextual value of the property relates to its contribution to a collection of initiatings constructed during the industrial and commercial development of Ritchener. The building on the subject property is in its original location and maintains bisocical and visual links to its summercial contributions.

73 Young Street

The property municipally addressed as 73 Young Street demonstrates design/physical, and historical/associative, and contexted values. The design and physical value of the property relates to its Gethic antifectural style, taid out in the shape of a Latin Cross with extensive use of departs/we brock and stone moulding, but resses, and directly thick ties, and overall symmetry of the church with similar façade and fenestration patterns throughout.

The historical and associative value of the property relates to the original owner and use of the property and building, and the combitutions made to Kitchener's history. The land has always been used as a drunch and contains one of the oldest churches in Kitchener. The subject property has direct associations with Arthur William Holmes, a prominent architect who devoted most of their career to designing buildings for the Roman Catholic Church in Southern Organic.

The contraction value of the property relates to physical, historical, functional, and visual taks to due heiding's somoundings. The church beliding has a strong visual presence, including important views, on Buke Street and Young Street as the beliding occupies a large site slightly elevated on a hill. The church building has also been recognised as a landmark within the City of Kitchener.

4 King Street East/1 Queen Street South

The property manufacility addressed as 4 King Street East/1 Queen Street South demonstrates design/physical, historical/associative contentual, and economic values.

The design and physical values relate to the loakenate profiled unal-style that is in good condition with many intest original elements.

The historical and associative values relate to the original owner and use of the building. The original owner of the building was Louis Breithaupt while the original use of the building was a hotel, tiled the American Hotel. The building is the oldest commercial building in the City. Louis Breithaupt was a prominent business in Berlin as well as a former mayor, and his contributions to the development of Berlin form an integral chapter in Berlin's commercial and industrial development.

This building has contextual value, being built in the downlown commercial core of then-Berlin and part of a group of buildings that were built at the cross of industrial and commercial development in the City. Today, these buildings are in the downlown commercial core of Kitchener and greatly contribute to the character of the area. The building is in its original location and maintains historical and visual links to its sumbundings. Furthermore, the building is located at a prominent intersection in the downlown city core.

2-22 Duke Street West

The property municipally addressed as 2-22 Dake Street West demonstrates design/physical. historical/associative, and contextual values.

The britishing municipally addressed as 2-22 Dake Street East has design and physical value, being a notable and unique example of the Art

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The properly has historical and associative values, as it relates directly to the theme of economic growth and development in the downsers area and has direct association with the Breithaupt family through its original ownership.

The contextual value of the property relates to its physical, historical, functional, and visual link to its surroundings. The building sits on the intersection of Queen Street North and Dake Street East, in its original location, it retains its original use as the home to multiple local beginnesses.

40 Chapel Hill Drive

The property municipally addressed as 40 Chapel IIII Shive comprehens design/physical, historical associative, and contextual values.

The design and physical value of 40 Chapet Hill Drive resides in its Modern architectural style, talc out in an Irregular floor plan and utilizing a mix of natural building materials including stone, we final wood siding and wood shingles. The chosen design is symbolic in nature, and release to the theology of the Carmet Church of New Jerusalem.

The historical and associative value of 40 Chapel Hill relates to the original owners and use of the property and building. The building was received by the Commel Church of New Jenusalem, who remain the owners to doze. The Cannel Church of the New Jenusalem is a society The historical and associative value of 40 Chapel HII relates to the uniqual namers and use of the property and building. The building was constructed by the Calmel Church of New Jerusalem, who remain the coveres to date. The Carmel Church of the New Jerusalem is a society of the New Chinch, which is a Christian denomination that follows the theological writings and interpretations of famous 18° century Swedish scientist, philosopher, and theological Ectabual Swedenburg. Such sents can be referred to as Swedenburgians. The Pennsylvania groups of Swedenburgian were one of the principal sources of immigration to Waterloo County, and later enabled the emergency of the iBerlin based after in the middle of the inneteenth commy. The property also provides a County, and later enabled the emergency of the iBerlin be area, being formally the centre of an independent and self-sufficient church community known as Carryndale. Utbanization and a growing population led to the community's evenual annexation into Kitchener in the 1970's. The contestual value of 40 Chapel Hill Drive relates to its importance in maintaining the character of the church-centred community formerly known as Caryndale. Though the area able has changed from community to neighbourhood and it has grown significantly through the construction of new subdivisions as well as infill development. The predominant residential use of the area remains. The audject properly and the sundoming area have been identified as being a Gultural Fleritage Landscape.

54-68 King Street West

The property municipality addressed as 54-58 King Street West demonstrates design/physical, historical/associative, and comextual values. The design and physical value of \$4-68 King Street West resides in its architecture and physical construction. The building is a unique expression of Medianist architecture that also utilizes classical and neo-classical metris, it is this sophisticated blending of different styles from varying eras that make the subject property a significant piece of architecture within the community. Through its carreital use and other detailing it also displays a high degree of cratmanship.

The historical and associative value of the property lay in its significant association with banking institutions. Prior to becoming the Bank of Nova Social in 1625, the property helid a building formerly known as the Memer Block, which was occupied by the Union Bank. The Werner Block was demoished in 1952 and replaced with the existing one-storey building. This building also has significance due to its association with programs and initiatives undertaken by the bank that reflected how such institutions and their processes changed and developed over time. It reflects the economic climate of both the area and, to some degree, the country at the time of its construction. The building was designed by Carl Albert Rieder, a prominent local and ited who made significant contributions to the field during the scan of his concern.

The contestual value of 54-58 King Street West relates to its importance in maintaining the commercial character of the suncurding area, as well as to physical, functions, wisual, and historical link to its surroundings. It is within the Downtown Cultural Hantage Landscape, which is within the City Centre Cistrict and is an area that has historically been recognized as the heart of the downtown and a focal coint of the Region, in addition, the distinct architectural style of 54-55 King Street West and its location on a corner tot along a primary road makes the building prominently visible and easily recognizable.

70 Francis Street Worth

The property municipally addressed as 70 Francis Street North demonstrates designiphysical, historical associative, and contextual values The building at 70 Francia Street North has design and physical value, being a representative example of a late-19° century residential dwelling constructed in the Queen Anne Revival architectural style.

The property has historical and associative value than to it's the original denership as well as its connection to the frame of economic development within the City. The residential dwelling was built for Albeit Richy, a prominent rition and life-long resident of Berlin (now Kitchener) and a major contribution to the furniture industry within the area. H. King Sumfure Company was established in the 1990's by Albert Richy in partnership with Hartman King its establishment was instrumental to the growth and development of the City and its economy, being resoluted to be the largest furniture plant in the British Empire in the early 1900's, King Furniture continues to be a larger in the design and manufacturing of furniture solutions, specifically now for offices and healthcare, and it remains one of the offest businesses still operating in Kitchener. The Study Tarrity still has cliently and applicant ties with the company, with Len Ruby being its president in 2023.

The contextual value of 70 Francis Street North relates to the physical, historical, and visual links to the surrounding area. The boilding is in its original legation along Francis Street North and is surrounded by other historic buildings. Though the house is now used as an office space, it continues to contribute to the confincity and character of the Francis Street North streetscape. Further, it is historically finited to the Krug Furniture factory located in proximity at 111 Alvens Street Wast 135 Breitraupt Street.

144-159 King Street West

The from façade of the property municipally addressed as 144-150 King Street West demonstrates design/physical, historical/associative. and contextual values.

The design and physical value of the building resides in its architecture and physical construction, as the building is a representative example of the Classical Rermal architectural style. A high degree of technical and scientific achievement is demonstrated, as the front façage is likely the first in the City to be built with precest concrete. In addition, this believed that this building was the first within the City to install an elevator.

The property has historical and associative value due to its connection to the theme of economic development in the conviction area. In 1849 David Weber sold a one-scre parcel of land north of King Street and east of Young Street, all within Lot 16 and part of the 2-arre trade mode by his father-in-law in 1833 to Frederick Gauket. This parcel became the site of the Mayfair Biotel and the Weber Chambers, which is the inscription seen on the parapet of 144-150-King Street West. The Weber Chambers building originally housed starefronts on the ground floor and office spaces above, and was harde to a number of notation tenants.

The contextual value of the building release to its importance in maintaining the commercial character of the someunding area, as well as its physical, functional, visual, and historical link to its suncoundings. The suncounding area is occupied by a mix of uses, with hole's, banks, and other commercial enterprises being the original anchors of the commercial core. Though the upper screays are now residential units, the ground floor maintains its original commercial use and continues to support the commercial character of the area

149-151 Ontario Street North

The property manicipally addressed as 149-151 Ordano Street North demonstrates design/physical, and historical/associative values. The building is an early example of a late 19th century, semi-detached, vertection brick building with both flatianate and modest Georgian influences.

The property has historical and associative value because it is the last remaining example of a residential building in this section of Ontario Street North and is an example of a working class residence.

628 New Dundee Road

The property municipally addressed as 628 New Dundee Road demonstrates design/objects, historical/associative, and contextual values. The coeffing on the lot is a representable and early example of a desting constructed in the Gathic Rawhal Coffage and healths style. Common features characteristic of this specific style are displayed, and the building was constructed prior to Confederation in #857.

Historical associative values are displayed as the property was once a working 19° century agricultural farm complex and is therefore associated with themes of agriculture and mid-19° century agricultural practices. Further, it is essociated with the theme of early settlement in the Beastey's Cid Survey area of Waterloo Township. The structure also deconcentrates local materials available to settlers and common transformation creditors utilized during the late nineteenth century and, when compared to similar style buildings within the area, reveals some

The dwelling on the lot has contestual value as the surroundings largely retain their rural character. The farmhouse also mentains a relationship to and remains oriented towards New Dundse Road, which is the original sattement road that once beauted the lot. As such, the dwelling has a physical link to its surroundings.

67 King Street East

The property municipality addressed as 67 KP ng Street East demonstrates deagraphysical, historicallassociative, and contentual values, The design and physical value of the subject property resides in the architecture and physical construction of the building. It is a unique and representative example of the International architectural style in a commercial building.

The building possesses historical and associative value due to its original use and ownership. The building was originally owned and operated by the Canada Permanent Trust Company, whose origins as a bust company data back to 1865. At the time that 67 King Street East was constructed. Canada Permanent was the cidest trust company in Canada. The architecture firm which das goed the building also contributes to the historical and associative value of 67 King Street East. The building was designed by the time of prominent local architect Carl Reider.

The contestual value of 67 King Street East relates to its importance in maintaining the commercial character of the surrounding axes, as well as its physical, functional, visual, and historical link to its surroundings. The subject property is located within the Downtown Cultural Heritage Landscape, in an axes commanty recognized as the heart of the downtown and the historically focal point of early development in what was then Berlin. Further it is located in-structural and actable setting, as the building provides a frame for the adjacent Speakers Comer Park space.

The full Statements of Significance, comaining a list of the hartiage attributes, is available in the Office of the City Clink by contacting <u>clerks pix trainer or</u> during normal business nours. Any person may send by Registered Mail, or deliver to the Clink of the City of Kitchener, notice of their objections to the proposed designation, together with a statement of the reasons for objection and all reversor facts, to be received by the Clerk no later than the 14° day of January, 2024. If a Notice of Objection is received, the Council of the Corporation of the City of Kitchener will refer the matter to the Ontario Land Tributed (<u>through call</u>) for a hearing and report.

SCHEDULE B

STATEMENT OF CULTURAL HERITAGE VALUE OR INTEREST

2-22 DUKE STREET EAST, KITCHENER

Description of Cultural Heritage Resource

2-22 Duke Street East is a two-storey early 20th century brick commercial building constructed in the Art Deco architectural style. The building is situated on a 0.09-acre parcel of land located on the north side of Duke Street East between Queen Street North and Frederick Street in the City Commercial Core Planning Community of the City of Kitchener within the Region of Waterloo. The principal resource that contributes to the heritage value is the commercial building.

Heritage Value

2-22 Duke Street East is recognized for its design/physical, historical/associative, and contextual value.

Design/Physical Value

The building municipally addressed as 2-22 Duke Street East has design and physical value, being a notable and unique example of the Art Deco architectural style as well as displaying a high degree of craftmanship through the many detailed elements of the structure. The building is two-storeys in height and possesses approximately 50 metres of frontage along Duke Street East, creating a long horizontal backdrop for the streetscape.

Front (South) Façade

The front of the building faces Duke Street East and is comprised of thirteen pilasters that create twelve bays of varying widths. The two bays on the west and the three bays on the east may be additions that were added after the original construction period, as the height of the roof is slightly lower, and the pilasters differ in appearance. Further, they create an unsymmetrical composition and lack masonry detailing about the second story windows that is visible on the seven center bays. The three western-most pilasters and four eastern-most pilasters appear to be made from cast-concrete, while the remaining six pilasters in the center are brick. Each of the thirteen are capped with decorative stone detailing, with the two central most containing stone finials and floral motifs as well. Each bay, except the central portion, contains two single hung windows with soldier course heading and stone sills on the second story. The centre-most bay contains a two-storey semi-circular opening that serves as a central entrance. Stonework with the Breithaupt Family Grant of Arms tops this semi-circular arch.

West (Side) Façade

The west side façade faces Queen Street North and is framed by two pilasters composed of cast-concrete and topped with a decorative stone cap. A stone belt course divides the two storeys. The rest of the façade is covered with angel brick.

East Side Façade

The east façade directly abuts the adjacent building and is not visible.

Rear North Façade

The rear north façade is primarily composed of brick, though a portion of the eastern end has vinyl cladding. Casement windows with stone sills are placed in a symmetrical pattern along the second storey, except for the vinyl-cladded portion.

Historical Value

The property has historical and associative value as it relates to the theme of economic growth and development in the downtown area as well as its direct association with the Breithaupt family.

The building was constructed and originally owned by William Henry Breithaupt. The Breithaupt's were a prominent family in the history of Kitchener, being involved in numerous businesses including the Breithaupt Leather Company, the Berlin Gas Company, and the Berlin and Waterloo Railway. The family also had a strong political presence, with different members acting as mayors of then-Berlin as well as being members of the House of Commons.

William H. Breithaupt was a civil engineer by education, graduating from the prestigious Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute in New York in 1881. At the time of his death, he had lived to be one of the oldest graduates of the school. Upon his return from the United States to Berlin in 1900, he carried on the family interest in both the Berlin and Waterloo Railway and the Berlin Gas Company, which had been previously managed by his late brother Carl. In addition, W.H. Breithaupt took grate interest in both city planning and heritage preservation, being the first chairman of the City Planning Commission from 1917-1921 as well as a past president of the Ontario Historical Society. He directly contributed to the organization and establishment of the Waterloo Historical Society in 1912, acting as the first president and holding the position for twelve consecutive years.

W.H Breithaupt built the Bridgeport Line in 1902, which were later taken over by the city as public enterprises along with the Waterloo line and the Gas Company. Other notable builds of his include the casino for the Bridgeport Railway Park and the Grand River Country Clubhouse, which was the site that first introduced golf to Kitchener. He was directly involved with the initiative which led to the erection of the Memorial Tower and was a part of the development of the Grand River Conservation Scheme, pioneering flood control and conservation through storage reservoirs. Through his efforts the opening of Duke Street from Queen to Frederick Street was also secured.

Mr. Breithaupt was recognized by membership in the Engineering Institute of Canada (past member of Council), the Institution of Civil Engineers (Great Britain), the American Society of Civil Engineers (Life Member), the American Institute of Consulting Engineers and the academic fraternity of Sigma Xi.

Since its construction in 1931, 2-22 Duke Street has been home to numerous businesses. The sites first tenant was Herman Ahrens, who worked as a local tailor. Other early shops included Freddie and Jack's Sporting Goods, Grip Tite Roofing, and the Sheehy Brothers. The commercial use of the building continues to this day.

Contextual Value

The contextual value of the property relates to its physical, historical, functional, and visual link to its surroundings. The building sits on the intersection of Queen Street North and Duke Street East, in its original location. It retains its original use as the home to multiple local businesses. It is surrounded by other historic buildings, including 49 Queen

Street North (St Peter's Lutheran Church) to the south, 10 Duke Street to the west (the former head office of the Economical Mutual Fire Insurance Company of Kitchener), and 15-29 Duke Street East to the north (the Federal Building, which is both a Recognized Federal Heritage Building and listed on the Kitchener Municipal Heritage Register).

 - o Concrete sills and soldier course headings;
