CORPORATION OF THE CITY OF KITCHENER

Being a by-law to designate the property municipally addressed as 144-150 King Street West, in the City of Kitchener as being of historic and cultural heritage value or interest.

WHEREAS section 29 of the *Ontario Heritage Act*, R.S.O. 1990, C. 0.18, authorizes the Council of a Municipality to enact by-laws to designate real property, including all of the buildings and structures thereon, or portions thereof, to be of cultural heritage value or interest;

AND WHEREAS the Council of The Corporation of the City of Kitchener has received and considered the recommendations of its municipal heritage committee (Heritage Kitchener) regarding the designation of a property located at 144-150 King Street West, Kitchener (the "Property");

AND WHEREAS the Council of The Corporation of the City of Kitchener resolved at its Council Meeting held on December 11, 2023, to publish a Notice of Intention to designate the Property as being of cultural heritage value or interest pursuant to section 29 of the *Ontario Heritage Act*, R.S.O. 1990, C. O.18, and which resolution was confirmed by By-law No. 2023-183;

AND WHEREAS a copy of the Notice of Intent to Designate was served upon the registered owners of the Property and upon the Ontario Heritage Trust;

AND WHEREAS a copy of the Notice of Intent to Designate was published in the Waterloo Region Record, which is a newspaper having general circulation in the City of Kitchener on December 15, 2023, a copy of which is attached to this by-law as "Schedule A";

AND WHEREAS no Notice of Objection to the proposed designation has been served upon the Clerk of the City of Kitchener;

NOW THEREFORE the Council of The Corporation of the City of Kitchener enacts as follows:

- 1. The building and property known as 144-150 King Street West, Kitchener, as more particularly described in Schedules "B" and "C" to this by-law are hereby designated as being of cultural value or interest under Part IV, section 29 of the Ontario Heritage Act, R.S.O. 1990, C. 0.18;
- 2. The City Solicitor is hereby authorized to cause a copy of this by-law to be registered against the whole of the property described in Schedule "D" to this by-law with the Land Registry Office;
- The City Clerk is hereby authorized to cause a copy of this by-law to be served upon the registered owners of the property described in Schedule "D" to this bylaw and on the Ontario Heritage Trust; and,
- 4. The City Clerk is hereby authorized to publish a notice of this by-law in a newspaper having general circulation in the City of Kitchener.

NOTICE OF INTENTION

TAKE NOTICE that the Council of the Corporation of the City of Ritchens: Intends to designate the following municipal addresses as being of outural heritage value or interest under Part IV of the Critario Heritage Act. R.5.0. 1990, Chapter Q.18, as amended.

24 Courtland Avenue East

The property manuspally addressed as 24 Courdand Avenue East demonstrates design/physical, instructions and contentral value. The design and physical nature of the property relates to the unique Vernacular Victorian Golftic architectural style. Walk-up now ficuring is rare in the context of Kichener, as there are not many examples of this housing typology within the City.

The instance and especialize value of the property relates to the original owner, purpose, and retallionship to adjacent industrial buildings. The wak-up now increasing is representative of the industrial development that was taking place in (Richener in the late 19° and early 20° century. The building was constructed by Martin Relson to accommodate the female workers from the adjacent Williams, Greene and Some Statush Coffer Factory on Queen Street South (now knowness the Bread and Roses Cooperative).

The contestual value of the property relates to the building's historic and visual link to the adjacent industrial buildings, including the former Williams, Greene and Rome Shist and Collar Factory and the Arrow Shirt Factory.

25 Courtland Avenue East

The property municipally addressed as 26 Countend Avenue East demonstrates designiphysical. Fistorical associative and contextual value.

The design and physical value of the property relates to the unique Vernacular Victorian Gritic architectural style. Walk-up now housing is rate in the context of Kitchaner, with not many examples of this housing typology within the City.

The interior all and associative value of the property relates to the original owner, purpose, and relationship to edjacent industrial buildings. The restaur now trousing is representative of the analystic development that was taking place in Kitchener in the late 19" and early 20" dealury. The building was constructed by Martin Nelson to accommodate the female workers from the adjacent Williams. The property menicipally addressed as 58 Queen Sheet South demonstrates designiphysical, and historical/associative, and contextual values. The design and physical value of the property relates to the building being a expresentative example of the Renaissance Revival architectural style that is in good condition with many in-tact original elements.

The historical and associative value of the property relates to the original center and use of the property as well as the contribution stade to the history of kitchener's development.

The contextual value of the property relates to its contribution to a collection of buildings constructed curing the industrial and commercial development of Kilchengr. The building on the subject property is in its original location and maintains historical and visual links to its summarkness.

66 Queen Street South

The property municipality actinessed as 86 Queen Street South demonstrates designiphysical, and historical/associative, and contextual values. The design and physical value of the property mates to the building being a representative exactple of the Renaissance Revival architectural style that is in good condition with many in-fact original elements.

The historical and associative value of the property relates to the original owner and use of the property, as well as the contribution made to the history of followers's development.

The contextual value of the property relates to its contribution to a policyfun of huitings operated during the industrial and commercial development of Michener. The building on the subject property is in its original location and maintains historical and visual toke to its suppositions.

73 Young Street

The property municipally addressed as 79 Young Street demonstrates design/physical, and historical/associative, and contextual values. The design and physical value of the property relates to its Getric architectural style, laid que in the shape of a Latin Cross with extensive use of decorative brick and stone mouking, butnesses, and circular brick ties, and overall symmetry of the church with similar façade and fearestration patterns throughout.

The historical and associative value of the property relates to the original owner and use of the property and building, and the contributions made to Kitchener's history. The land has always been used as a church and contains one of the otical chardres in Kitchener. The subject property has direct associations with Arthur William Holmes, a prominent architect who devoted most of their career to designing buildings for the Roman Cathotic Church in Southern Ordanio.

The contracted value of the property relates to physical, historical, functional, and visual firsts to the building's surroundings. The church building has a strong visual presence, including important visws, on Duke Street and Young Street as the building occupies a large site slightly elevated on a bill. The church building has also been recognized as a landmark within the City of Sitcheser.

4 King Street East/1 Owen Street South

The property municipalty addressed as 4 King Steet East/1 Queen Street South demonstrates design(physical, historical/associative, contentual, and economic values.

The design and physical values relate to the Italianste architectural style that is in good condition with many intect original elements,

The historical and associative values relate to the original owner and use of the building. The original owner of the building was Louis Breithaupt while the original use of the building was a hotel, tilled the American Hotel. The building is the oldest commercial building in the City. Louis Breithaupt was a prominent business in Berlin as well as a former mayor, and this contributions to the development of Berlin form an integral chapter in Berlin's commercial and industrial development.

This building has correctual value, being built in the downtown commercial core of thery-Berlin and part of a group of buildings that were built at the onset of industrial and commercial development in the City. Today, these buildings are in the downtown commercial core of kitchener and greatly contribute to the character of the area. The building is in its original location and maintains historical and visual links to its surroundings. Furthermore, the building is located at a prominent intersection in the downtown city core.

2-22 Duine Street West

The property municipally addressed as 2-22 Duke Street West demonstrates design/physical, historical/associative, and contextual values. The building municipally addressed as 2-22 Duke Street East has design and physical value, being a notable and unique example of the Art Deso architectural style as well as displaying a high degree of craftmanship through the many detailed elements of the structure.

The property has historical and associative values, as it relates directly to the theme of economic growth and development in the downtows area and has direct association with the Breithaupt family through its original ownership.

The oxclosteal value of the property relates to its physical, historical, functional, and visual link to its surroundings. The building six untre-intersection of Queen Street North and Dake Street East, in its original location. It returns its original use as the name to multiple local businesses.

40 Chapel Hill Drive

The property municipally addressed as 40 Chapel 161 Drive demonstrates design/physical, historical/associative, and contextual values.

The design and physical value of 40 Chapel Hill Once resides in halfoldern architectural style, laid out in an imaginar floor plan and othering a mix of natural building materials including stone, we fical wood siding and wood stringles. The chosen design is symbolic in nature, and relates to the theology of the Carmel Church of New Jerusalem.

The historical and associative value of 40 Chapel HR relates to the original owners and use of the property and building. The building was constructed by the Carmel Church of New Jerusalem, who remain the owners to date. The Carmel Church of the New Jerusalem is a society of the New Church, which is a Christian denomination that follows the theological writings and interpretations of famous 12° century Swedish scientists, philosopher, and theological Emanual Swedenburg. Such sents can be referred to as Swedenburgians. The Pennsylvania groups of Swedenburgian were one of the principal sources of immigration to Wateriele County, and later enabled the emigration of the Berlin Association in the middle of the inheteents commy. The property also provides some insightimic patterns of growth and development within the area, being formally the centre of annotatement and self-sufficient church community known as Canyndale. When izone and a growing population lied to the community's eventual annexation into Kitchener in the 1970's. The contestual value of 40 Chapel Hill Drive relates to its importance in maintaining the character of the church-centred community formerly known as Caryndale. Though the area's title has changed from community to neighbourhood and it has grown significantly through the construction of new subdivisions as well as infill development, the predominant residential use of the area remains. The subject properly and the summonding area have been identified as being a Cultural Perforage Landbooke.

54-68 King Street West

The property municipally addressed as 54-68 King Street West demonstrates design/physical, historical/associative, and contextual values. The design and physical value of 54-88 King Street West resides in its architecture and physical construction. The building is a unique expression of Modernist architecture that also utilizes classical and neo-classical motifs. It is this sophisticated blending of different styles from varying eras that crase the subject property a significant piece of architecture within the community. Through its material use and other detailing it also displays a high degree of cratmanship.

The historical and especiative value of the property ley in its significant association with benking institutions. Prior to becoming the Bank of Nove Social in 1925, the property held a building formerly known as the Memer Block, which was occupied by the Union Bank. The Memer Block was demaisted in 1952 and replaced with the existing pre-storey building. This building also has significance due to its association with programs and initiatives undertaken by the bank that reflected how such institutions and their processes changed and developed over time. It reflects the economic climate of both the area and, to some degree, the country at the time of its construction. The building was designed by Carl Albert Rieder, a prominent local and feet who made significant contributions to the field during the span of his career.

The contextual value of \$4-88 King Street West relates to its importance in maintaining the commercial character of the sumoutding area, as well as no physical, functional, visual, and historical link to its sumoundings. It is within the Downtown Cultural Heritage Landscepe, which is within the City Centre District and is an area that has historically bean recognized as the heart of the downtown and a local point of the Region. In addition, the distinct architectural style of \$4-85 King Street West and its location on a corner to along a primary road makes the building prominently visible and easily recognizable.

70 Francis Street Worth

The property municipally addressed as 70 Francis Street North demonstrates design/physical, historical/associative, and comextual values The building at 70 Francis Street North has design and physical value, being a representative example of a late-15° century residential dwelling constructed in the Queen Anne Revival architectural object.

The property has historical and associative value due to it's the original denember as well as its connection to the theme of economic development within the City. The residential dwelling was built for Attent Ridby, a prominent citizen and life-long resident of Berlin (now Kitchener) and a major contributor to the familiars industry within the area. H. King Furniture Company was established in the 1990's by Wibert. Ridby in parametric path with Hartman King, its establishment was instrumental to the growth and development of the City and its economy, being regulated to be the largest furniture point in the British Empire in the early 1990's. King Furniture continues to be a leaser in the design and manufacturing of furniture solutions, specifically now for offices and healthcare, and it remains one of the oldest businesses still operating in Nitchener. The Ridby family still has cited and significant has with the company, with Len Ridby being it's president in 2023.

The contextual value of 70 Francis Street North relates to the physical, historical, and visual links to the surrounding area. The building is in its original location along Francis Street North and is surrounded by other historic buildings. Though the house is now used as an office space, it continues to contribute to the continuity and character of the Francis Street North street/scape. Further, it is historically linked to the Krug Furniture factory located in proximity at 111 Alberts Street West*135 Breithaugt Street.

154-150 King Street West

The front façade of the property municipally addressed as 144-190 King Street West demonstrates design/physical, historical/associative and contextual values.

The design and physical value of the building resides in its architecture and physical construction, as the building is a representative example of the Classical Revival architectural style. A high degree of technical and adentific achievement is demonstrated, as the front façade is likely the distribution to City to the built with precest concrete, in addition, it is believed that this building was the first within the City to install an elevator.

The property has historical and associative value due to its connection to the theme of economic development in the downtown area. In 1860 David Weber stild a one-acre passet of land north of King Street and éast of Young Street, all within Lot 16 and part of the 1-acre trade made by his father-in-law in 1830 to Frederick Causet. This passet became the site of the Mayfair biotel and the Weber Chambers, which is the inscription seen on the parapet of 144-150 King Street West. The Weber Chambers building originally housed storefroms on the ground-loor and office spaces above, and was forme to a number of notable tenants.

The confecuel value of the building releas to its importance in maintaining the commercial character of the surrounding area, as well as its physical, functional, visual, and historical link to its surroundings. The surrounding area is docuped by a mix of uses, with hotels, banks, and other commercial enterprises being the original anchors of the commercial core. Though the upper scores are now residential units, the ground floor maintains its original commercial use and continues to support the commercial character of the area

149-151 Ontario Street North

The property monicipally addressed as 149-15° Ordano Street North demonstrates design/physical, and historical/associative values. The building is an early example of a late 19° century, semi-detached, vernequier brick building with both traitanate and modest Georgian influences.

The property has historical and associative value because it is the last remaining-example of a residential building to this section of Ontario Street North and is an example of a working-class residence.

625 New Dundee Road

The property municipally addressed as 828 New Dundée Road demonstrates design/physical, historical/associative, and contextual values. The dealing on the lot is a representative and early example off a dwalling constructed in the Gothic Revival Cottage and nadural style. Common features characteristic of this specific style are displayed, and the building was constructed prior to Confederation in 1867.

Historical expositive values are displayed as the property was once a working 19" certury agricultural farm complex and is therefore associated with themes of agriculture and mid-19" century agricultural predices. Further, it is essociated with the theme of early settlement in the Beastley's Citi Survey area of Waterloo Township. The structure also deconomistates local materials available to settlers and common construction created a driving the late nineteenth century and, when compared to similar style buildings within the area, reveals some achitectural trends.

The dwelling on the lot has contextual value as the surroundings largely retain thair rural character. The farmhouse also maintains a relationship to and remains onented towards New Dundes Boad, which sine original settlement road that once bisected the lot. As such, the dwelling has a physical link to its sumoundings.

67 King Street East

The property municipalty addressed as 67 King Street East demonstrates designiphysical, historical/associative, and consistual values. The design and physical value of the subject property resides in the architecture and physical construction of the building. It is a unique and representative exemple of the international architectural style in a commercial building.

The building possesses his forcal and associative value due to its original use and ownership. The building was originally owned and operated by the Canada Permanent Trust Company, whose origins as a frust company date back to 1955. At the time that 67 King Street East was constructed. Ceneda Permanent was the oldest trust company in Canada. The exchitecture firm which das goed the building also contributes to the historical and associative value of 67 King Street East. The building was designed by the time of prominent focal architect Cart Rektar.

The contested value of 67 King Street East relates to the importance in maintaining the commercial character of the surrounding area, as well as its physical, functions, should, and it sorted link to its summarings. The subject reperty is located within the Downtown Outside Heritage Landscape, in an area commonly recognized as the heast of the downtown and the historically focal point of early development in what was then Sentin. SCHEDULE B

STATEMENT OF CULTURAL HERITAGE VALUE OR INTEREST

144-150 KING STREET WEST, KITCHENER

Description of Cultural Heritage Resource

144-150 King Street West is a four-storey late 19th century cast concrete commercial building built in the Classical Revival architectural style. The building is situated on 0.15 acre parcel of land located on the north side of King Street West between Young Street and Ontario Street in the City Commercial Core of the City of Kitchener in the Region of Waterloo. The principal resource that contributes to the heritage value is the four-storey commercial building.

Heritage Value

144-150 King Street is recognized for its design/physical, historical/associative, and contextual values.

Design/Physical Value

The design and physical value of the building resides in its architecture and physical construction. The building is a representative example of the Classical Revival architectural style in a commercial building. The structure is four-storeys in height. Renovations to the front were completed in the early 21st century, which included covering the original pre-cast concrete cladding with a different cladding. Though some original detailing was lost, the work largely maintained the original appearance of the structure.

Front (South) Façade

The building fronts onto King Street West. The front façade is divided vertically by five piers, three storeys in height, creating four bays. Each bay contains a single-hung window on every storey except the ground floor. The structure is divided horizontally by a corbel table above the first storey, with a second corbel table sitting above the fourth storey and below the parapet. Crenels are cut into the parapet, giving the roofline a unique and distinct shape. The parapet also contains an inscription that reads "Weber Chambers", which gives the structure its name.

The building also demonstrates a high degree of technical and scientific achievement. The King Street West façade is likely the first in the City to be built with a precast concrete façade. The current façade is clad with an exterior insulation and finishing system (EIFS) similar to stucco; however, the original precast concrete façade still exists behind the new cladding. In addition, it is believed that this building was the first building within the City to install an elevator.

Historical/Associative Value

The subject property has historical and associative value due to its connection to the theme of economic development in the downtown area.

In 1840 David Weber sold a one-acre parcel of land north of King Street and east of Young Street, all within Lot 16 and part of the 3-acre trade made by his father-in-law in 1833 to Frederick Gaukel. This parcel became the site of the Mayfair Hotel and the Weber Chambers, which is the inscription seen on the parapet of 144-150 King Street West. The Weber Chambers building originally housed storefronts on the ground floor and office spaces above. Notable tenants of the property have included: London Life Conservatory of Music (1912); Met Life Insurance Co. (1912); Wm. Cairnes, Real Estate (1912); H.L. Staebler Co. Ltd., Insurance (1924 and 1933); Salts and Chemicals, Ltd. (1924); Bricker & Sons, Ltd., Wholesale Jeweler (1924); R.W. Ripley, Dental Laboratory (1933); and, G.E. Schlee, Advertising (1933). The site was the long-time home to the Palladium Restaurant, whose "Candy, Ice Cream, Palladium Restaurant" sign was easily recognizable by locals at the time, and which served downtown Kitchener well into the 1980's. Also operating for many years under the Palladium was William G. Sahli, a watchmaker-jeweler. William. G. Sahli's career spanned 68 years, concluding with his retirement in 1978 at the age of 83. He had serviced three generations of the same family and other locals within the area, and, like the Palladium Restaurant, became a staple of the Kitchener downtown. In 1985 the second to fourth storey office spaces were converted to residential uses, but the ground floor retains its commercial uses.

Contextual Value

The contextual value of the building relates to its importance in maintaining the commercial character of the surrounding area, as well as its physical, functional, visual, and historical link to its surroundings. The subject property is located within the Downtown Cultural Heritage Landscape, which is within the City Centre District and is an area that has historically been recognized as the heart of the downtown and a focal point of the Region. The area is occupied by a mix of uses, with hotels, banks, and other commercial enterprises being the original anchors of the commercial core. Though the upper storeys are now residential units, the ground floor maintains its original commercial use and continues to support the commercial character of the area. In addition, while this area has continued to evolve, many of the late-19th century and early-20th century commercial structures like 144-150 Weber Street remain today and further contribute to the character of the area.
