NOTICE OF INTENTION

NOTICE is hereby given that the council of The Corporation of The Town of Gananoque intends to designate as a property of historic or architectural value or interest, the building owned by The Corporation of The Town of Gananoque known as The Clock Tower located upon part of Block "OP", East of the Gananoque River, according to Plans of the town.

The reason for the proposed designation is to preserve a structure which is an example of a unusual type of architecture with one of the founding families of Gananoque, having been donated to the town in 1894 by Charles MacDonald.

NOTICE is hereby given that the council of The Corporation of The Town of Gananoque intends to designate the building owned by [REDACTED], known as the Old Post Office located on Lot 14, Block "O", east of the Gananoque River according to Plan 86 of the Town.

The reason for the proposed designation is to preserve a Romanesque structure which is one of the few former post offices left anywhere in Canada designed by Thomas Fuller, architect of the first Centre Block of the Parliament Buildings, having been built in 1853.

Notice of objection to the designation may be served upon the Clerk of the Town of Gananoque within 30 days of the date of the first publication of this notice of intention in the Gananoque Reporter.
