TAKE NOTICE that the Council of the Corporation of the Village of Port Stanley intends to designate the property, including lands and buildings, at the following municipal address 194 Main St., Port Stanley, as a property of architectural and historical value or interest under Part IV of The Ontario Heritage Act, R.S.O. 1980, Chapter 337.

REASONS FOR THE PROPOSED DESIGNATION

194 Main Street is recommended for designation for architectural and historical reasons. Historically it is significant as being representative of the commercial fishing industry that boomed in Port Stanley in the first decades of this century.

It is the largest and one of the few remaining original fish shanties on the harbour.

Architecturally, both the size and the symmetrical proportions of the building attribute to its dominance on the east side of the harbour. The symmetric arrangement and number of windows is particularly significant as they expose the east, south and west facades to both natural light and heat in the large structure that was originally heated by only small coal stoves. External siding of the building is double V horizontal cedar and the steeply pitched roof with four dormers was originally cedar shingles.

Overall, the building has the appearance of an East Coast fishery and it is believed to be a copy of that style.

Notice of objection to the proposed designation, together with a statement of the reasons for the objection and all relevant facts may be served on the Clerk of the Village of Port Stanley before the 24 day of May, 1983.
