Take notice that the Council of the Corporation of the City of Toronto on the 1st day of October, 1975, decided to designate the lands and buildings, known municipally as 1-21 Front Street West, as a property of architectural value or interest under The Ontario Heritage Act, 1974, S.O. Chapter 122.


Short Statement of the Reasons for the Proposed Designation:

The Dominion Public Building; Customs and Excise; Nos. 1-21 Front Street West, begun in 1929 by Thomas W. Fuller, Dominion Architect; continued in 1935 by J. H. Craig.

The Dominion Public Building is recommended for designation for architectural reasons as an important example of Beaux Art classicism designed to complement the grandeur of Union Station. It also has streetscape significance because of the manner in which it follows the curve of Front Street to create, with Union Station, one of the grandest streets in Canada.

Notice of objection to the designation may be served on the Clerk within thirty days of October 10th, 1975.
