BY-LAW NO. 88-118

A BY-LAW TO DESIGNATE THE PROPERTY KNOWN MUNICIPALLY AS 2 THIRD STREET, AS BEING OF ARCHITECTURAL AND/OR HISTORICAL VALUE OR INTEREST

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WHEREAS Section 29 of The Ontario Heritage Act, R.S.O. 1980, Chapter 337 NOV 2 5 1083 authorizes the Council of a municipality to enact by-laws to designate real property, including all buildings and structures thereon, to be of CNTARIA architectural or historic value or interest; and

WHEREAS the Council of The Corporation of the Town of Grimsby has caused to be served on the owners of the lands and premises known municipally as 2 Third Street, and upon the Ontario Heritage Foundation, notice of intention to so designate the aforesaid real property and has caused such notice of intention to be published in the same newspaper having general circulation in the municipality once for each of three consecutive weeks; and

WHEREAS the reasons for designation are set out in Schedule 'B' hereto; and

WHEREAS no notice of objection to the proposed designation has been served on the Town Administrator of the municipality; and

THEREFORE THE COUNCIL OF THE CORPORATION OF THE TOWN OF GRIMSBY ENACTS AS FOLLOWS: -

- There is designated as being of architectural and/or historical value or interest the real property known municipally as 2 Third Street, more particularly described in Schedule 'A' attached hereto.
- The municipal solicitor is hereby authorized 2. to cause a copy of this by-law to be registered against the property described in Schedule 'A' attached hereto in the proper land registry office.
- The Town Administrator is hereby authorized 3. to cause a copy of this by-law to be served on the owner of the aforementioned property and on the Ontario Heritage Foundation and to cause notice of the passing of this by-law to be published in the same newspaper having general circulation in the municipality once for each of three consecutive weeks.
